## SOUR SKIM MILK FOR CALVES

The Weekly News Letter, printed by the Department of Agriculture says that in summer time calves do as well on sour skim milk as they do on sweet which will be interesting news to farmers who have hitherto been kept from raising calves by the expense of keeping the milk sweet in hot weather. This expense experiment carried out by the department indicate to be quite unnecessary. The calves will make as rapid gains on sour skim milk. In winter, it is true, this is not quite so satisfactory. It chills the calves and some of them drink it with great reluctance. Very young calves have been known to refuse it altogether. On the other hand, of course, it is much easier to keep the milk sweet in winter.

In calling the attention to farmers to these facts, however, the department at the same time emphasizes an important precaution. Unless the milk is produced and kept under clean conditions, it may become contaminated with disease-producing bacteria. Farmers should therefore, allow the milk to sour quickly and then feed it without delay.

In the course of these experiments sour skim milk was fed to 22 calves, Holsteins, Jerseys and Guernseys, at different seasons of the year. In no case did it cause digestive disturbances even when the change from sweet to sour milk was made abruptly when the calves were only a few days old. Moreover, no evil results followed the alternate use of sweet and sour. It seems therefore that the common idea that sour milk leads to scours is quite unfounded.

The calves it was found, did not like the sour milk as well as the sweet, but the majority of cases soon became accustomed to it. The aversion however, increased when the milk was fed them at a low temperature.

### NOTICE OF ELECTION—CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Senate Bill No. 1.  
An act entitled: "An act for the submission to the qualified electors of the State of Montana of an amendment to Section 2 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Montana relating to rights of suffrage and qualifications to hold office."

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Montana be amended and that the question of such amendment be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Montana at the next general election.

Section 2. That Section 2 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Montana, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 2. Every person of the age of twenty-one years or over, possessing the following qualifications to be eligible to vote at all general elections and for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elective by the people and upon all questions which may be submitted to the vote of the people: First, he shall be a citizen of the United States; Second, he shall have resided in this State one year immediately preceding the election at which he offers to vote, and in the town, county or precinct such time may be prescribed by law; provided, first, that no person convicted of felony shall have the right to vote unless he has been pardoned; Provided, second, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to deprive any person of the right to vote who has such right at the time of the adoption of this Constitution; Provided, that after the expiration of five years from the time of the adoption of this Constitution, no person except citizens of the United States shall have the right to vote."

Section 3. Separate official ballots shall be used at the general election to be held in November, 1914, which shall have printed thereon the words: "For the amendment to the qualified electors of the State of Montana relating to rights of suffrage and qualifications to hold office" and the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution relating to rights of suffrage and qualifications to hold office." Each elector shall designate his preference for either of the propositions by marking an X before the proposition desired.

Section 4. All acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This act shall take effect and be in full force after its passage and approval.

Approved January 25, 1913.  
Enacted by the Thirtieth Legislative Assembly of the State of Montana and approved on the twenty-fifth day of January, 1913.
