WONDER TURNING OUT THE STUFF

SPIDER-WASP'S ORE BODY.

As illustrative of the brilliant prospects of the Wonder district, a visit to the workings of the Spider-Wasp Mining Co. is highly instructive. The group consists of five claims in the northwest section of the district. A big and continuous dike traverses the length of the property, and is conspicuous on neighboring ground on either side, with a general trend east and west. Along this dike what is believed to be the main ledge of this section of the district can be easily traced for 4000 feet on Spider-Wasp ground.

On the hillside about 200 feet below the general course of this ledge, the Spider-Wasp Company, with Alexander Johnson, who has a reputation as one of the best mining engineers in the State, as their representative, is sinking a permanent shaft. This has a man-way, and is finely timbered from top to bottom, a depth at the present writing of about 160 feet. A hoist run by a 40-horsepower gasoline engine in a corrugated iron house is in constant operation. A crosscut to the south has been started on the 100 level, and other crosscuts will be run at each successive 100 foot level as this shaft is sunk.

About 200 feet up the hill from the permanent shaft, and a little to the west, an inclined shaft, following the hanging wall of the vein, is being sunk. It is now down 50 feet. It is at the bottom of this inclined shaft that the best idea of the Spider-Wasp main ledge can be obtained. It has a slant from the vertical to the north of about 35 degrees. The hanging wall is perfect, and only a few inches of gouge separate the latter from the quartz, which reaches across a distance of between eight and ten feet to the foot wall. General Manager Johnson, who does not believe in deceiving himself or anybody else as to the quality of the rock, has taken many samples across the vein in different places from the hanging to the foot wall, and in each sample values have been found. Across six feet the average has been \$75 to the ton. It can no longer be doubted that there is a great body of ore of this grade. In addition to this ore, Mr. Johnson has been made confident by the formation and general indications that ore chutes carrying very much higher values will be encountered.

From the bottom of the inclined shaft a crosscut is being driven into the hill to catch a second ledge about 100 feet to the south, running parallel to the one already cut. It is the intention of Mr. Johnson to sink the inclined shaft about 175 feet, which will bring it to the 100 foot level of the permanent shaft, and then to connect the two with the crosscut already started at the 100 foot level in the permanent shaft.

In addition to the big showing in the inclined shaft, a further proof of the great ore body on Spider-Wasp ground is found in the crosscut at a depth of 75 feet on lease No. 20, about 250 feet from the inclined shaft. Here the vein has been found to have a width of 20 feet between perfect walls, with values similar to those already mentioned. Some of the other leasers on the Spider-Wasp ground have shown that this ledge carries, in places, unusually high grade rock, with considerable quantities of gold. The fact that the ledge can be traced without difficulty through the prop-

erties of the Desert Wonder, the Christmas Wonder, and other ground to the east, and through, among others, the Lout Chord and the Dickey V. on the west, gives this section of the district great prominence and promise.—Wonder Mining News.

BALD EAGLE'S \$1000 ORE.

In the shaft on the Bald Eagle property, which is now down thirty-five feet, rock is being taken from the hanging wall which shows values as high as \$1000 to the ton. The formation is somewhat broken, and a good deal of the quartz has been leached, at a loss of some of its silver values. But numerous bunches of it are hard, and it is these that show the notable richness in silver chlorides. The theory of General Manager Palmer is that this richness is the result of reprecipitation by the leaching process through the softer portions of the quartz, and that the heavy deposits of horn silver will be found wherever the rock has retained its hardness.

FIVE TONS DAILY.

It is reported that the Nevada Wonder Company is now in a position to ship at least five tons a day of ore that runs in the neighborhood of \$200 to the ton. Several hundred sacks are piled up near the mouth of the tunnel and seven sorters are continually busy. About 125 sacks have gone out within the last three or four days, but the shipments so far have been considerably impeded by a scarcity of teams for hauling the ore the sixty miles to the railroad.

This rich ore is being taken from the stopes in the tunnel. A good deal of the rock carries as much gold as silver, and some of it assays well beyond \$1000 to the ton.

Supt. Martindale, one of the ablest mine superintendents in the State, has returned to Wonder after a period of recuperation in the white settlements, and is again directing the work on the permanent shaft, which is down nearly 400 feet. It is the intention to crosscut to the ledge at the 500-foot level. The uncovering of a big ore body at this depth will banish any lingering doubts about the Nevada Wonder being a great mine. The results of the work thus far, and the developments on the Hidden Treasure ground, where the extension of the Nevada Wonder ledge has been found to have a width of thirty feet, have already established to a moral certainty the existence of wide veins and high values at depth on the Nevada Wonder.

ON THE JACK POT.

The visit during the week of Marvin Ish to the Jack Pot property, in which he and his associates hold a controlling interest, has resulted in plans for even faster development than that which has been carried on under the direction of General Manager Harris. Ten more men are to be put on the work next week, which addition will swell the total number to forty. The work at present is being concentrated on the crosscut on the 300-foot level in the shaft. This crosscut is now in eighty feet and has reached the vein, from which much of the rock runs \$400 to the ton and better. The intention is to confine the work largely to the 300-foot level for the next six weeks. Shipments are being made regularly.—Wonder Mining News.

AFTER COPPER PROPERTIES.

Heinze May Take Over Delmas Claim for \$300,000.

P. D. Delmas, who recently purchased the old Hunter and Hesson property at Palsade, has encountered a wonderful body of ore in the new district and is now shipping ore from the claims. He is also negotiating with Heinze agents for the sale of the property for more than \$300,000. The Guggenheims also have agents at Palsade examining the Delmas property and other properties of that district, and without a doubt some big sales will be made in the next few days.

The property purchased by Delmas of Salt Lake City had been worked by Hunter and Hesson for more than a year, but they failed to strike the main body of ore. Delmas sunk a shaft on another portion of the claim and soon uncovered a large ledge that will average more than 30 per cent in copper and give good values in silver. In some places the ore will run as high as 61 per cent in copper and 300 ounces in silver.

Delmas is now shipping ore from nine different workings and his mining experts claim that the property promises to be one of the richest in Nevada, after it has been properly developed.

W. C. Hollingworth of Palsade arrived in Reno last evening with some samples from the Delmas property and from other properties in Palsade and declares that the camp is now very active. He states that in his opinion Palsade will soon be ranked among the big copper camps.
