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LIVELY TIMES AT FARRELL.

Much Work Being Done in Seven Troughs Camp.

With the advent of cooler weather Farrell, in common with the towns of the district, is rapidly taking a more lively appearance. A number of eastern and California capitalists have recently visited the northern end of the district, the results being that preliminary steps have been taken toward the incorporation of several new companies, and within the next ten days work will be started on at least six properties.

The Seven Troughs Leaser, was incorporated last week by San Francisco capitalists, with George Mainhart as Manager. This company has some 1500 feet of preliminary work already done and it is proposed to commence active development work at once with a big force of men.

The Silver Leaf, owned by Senator Flannigan, James Dunn and associates, is being vigorously developed. The tunnel is now in for a distance of 180 feet. At this point quartz, very similar to that of the Fairview, was encountered.

The Jewell Mining company has five men at work crosscutting the diorite dyke. The management expects to cut the footwall of the ledge in a very few days. On the surface values as high as \$400 were obtained from the ledge, and it is believed sensational values will be found when the latter is tapped at depth. This company will sink a 200-foot shaft, and in order to facilitate work a substantial hoist will be installed. The hoist has been ordered.

M. E. Phelan has incorporated the Lost Bunch group. The property is being developed by tunnel and shaft. The latter will be sunk to a depth of 200 feet. Fresno and Bakersfield capitalists are backing the enterprise.

Charles Myers, general manager for the Grafton company, has a large force of men on his property adjoining the townsite. Three prospect tunnels and a shaft have been started, and are carrying more or less values has been cut in all the workings. The Grafton is slated as one of the first shippers from the north end of the district.

A. H. Baldwin, of Denver, who has extensive holdings throughout the state, has incorporated the Seven Troughs Mineral King Mining company, and now has a large force of men regularly employed in developing the ground. Mr. Baldwin is very enthusiastic over the present showing on his property, and says he has never seen such surface showings which yield the high assays as are found in the Seven Troughs district. The Mineral King management intends to install a hoist at an early date.

Harry Henry, who owns the Diamond H and Little Flo claims, has four men at work doing surface development and already several strong and promising ledges have been opened up. Prominent engineers who have recently made examinations of Mr. Henry's property place it among the best seen in any part of the district.

The Seven Troughs Gold Royal Mining company, which recently purchased five claims from Mr. Harris, has commenced active development. A shaft will be sunk 100 feet before a station is cut.

The Lewis group, which was recently incorporated and which is under the management of August Wedeman, is undergoing thorough development. A shaft has been sunk to a depth of sixty feet and at this point assays running better than \$100 are obtained from a well defined ledge.

Herman Erickson, who is operating the White Buttes, is prosecuting active development work and ex-

pects to have the initial shipment out in about two weeks.

The Indian Queen is being developed by William Thurman and Philadelphia associates. Immense bodies of high grade mill ore are being blocked out on this property, and the management is contemplating the erection of a mill.

The Seven Troughs promotion company has just taken an option on sixteen claims adjoining the Farrell townsite. The property is held at \$25,000, and it is understood that a party of Pittsburg capitalists are now on the way to close the deal.

The Little Hero group, owned by Thomas, English and associates, has been bonded to a Boston syndicate for \$12,000. There are four claims in the Little Hero group.—Vernon Miner.

DISCOVER NEW LEDGE.

Important Strike in Buckhorn Seven Troughs Property.

One of the most important strikes and one which will, no doubt, prove the equal, when opened up, of those made on the famous Kindergarten, Fairview and Mazuma Hills properties, was uncovered in the incline shaft on the Buckhorn last Saturday.

General Manager W. R. Mohler, when asked regarding the new find, said that as yet it had not been opened up sufficiently to determine its extent. It was our intention to cut a station at the 212 level, preparatory to crosscutting," continued Manager Mohler, "and to this end we were cleaning up from the last shots when the new ledge was discovered. A further examination revealed the presence of a well defined ledge covering the entire bottom of the shaft. The vein matter consists of sugar quartz heavily impregnated with iron sulphides, and is almost identical with the ores found in the Fairview, and it is my belief that when the ledge is opened up it will prove a bonanza. Our plans for crosscutting from this level have been changed, and instead of carrying out the original idea, we will continue sinking. The past week has been spent in timbering the shaft and by the first of the coming week sinking will be resumed."

Mr. Mohler stated that no effort would be made to develop the ledge at the present level, but that the shaft would be continued another fifty feet, giving a total depth of 262 feet. From this latter point a cross-cut will be started, and will be run to cut both the new found ledge and the one known as the oxidized ledge, which was followed down the incline shaft for a distance of 140 feet.

The new find on the Buckhorn has created considerable excitement among the mining men of the district and the result has been that much activity is noticeable among the fraternity holding property in the immediate vicinity.—Vernon Miner.

WORKING RIGHT ALONG.

Unfounded Rumor That Bullfrog National Bank Mine Closed Down.

Some one has circulated the report that the Bullfrog National Bank mine is closed down.

This is not the case. Work was started nearly two and one-half years ago on this property, and has not ceased a single day since.

The old National Bank property at Rhyolite, which helped largely to make early history in the Bullfrog district, has not been idle, as reported, and if you go up to the property today you will find Pat Lavelle at the big hoist and a bunch of men at work in the lower levels.

The east ledge of the National Bank estate has just been recovered on the 300-level, where it is being explored in a drift. The vein is composed of quartz, manganese and rhyolite, and assays made this week go as high as \$27. This ore has been cut at the extreme easterly point in the workings.

The east ledge is the only one that crops at the surface, where it was explored by several open cuts in the early days of the development. There it shows some fine values, and Superintendent Boyd believes that he will open rich ore by drifting.

Connection is now being made between the 250 and 300 levels by a raise, which has about ten feet to go, the raise being in ore of a milling grade. After this work is accomplished attention will again be directed to the high grade shoots on the lower levels from which a shipment of ore was made a short time ago.

The main stop, which is about forty-five feet above the level, is all in ore, and should the values extend to the surface, there will be 150 feet of additional stopping ground. Some of this ore runs into the picture values, a feature which is frequently encountered in the workings.

National Bank high grade, as a rule, is spotted with hematite of iron. The milling ore, of which there are several shoots in the property, carry considerable manganese and talc.

Manager W. H. Eddy, of the National Bank company, says that the company would be glad of an opportunity to patronize a custom mill, and will send ore to the Shoshone mill if arrangements can be made. There is much ore in the workings that could be converted into development money, and at this time, when the stock market is so low, such an arrangement would be especially appreciable to several of the working properties.—Rhyolite Herald.
