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## ROSEBUD IS PROVING UP.

Mines are Looking Better Than Ever Before.

There has never been a time in the short history of the Rosebud mining district when the prospects of the camp were so bright as at present. It is true that the population of the town is now less than it was during the spring and early summer—but that is true of every other mining camp in the state. The deserts of Nevada are not famous for their pleasant climatic conditions, and during the summer months every person who is able to do so leaves the mining towns for their old homes or for the alluring breezes of the seashore. Many people who have left Rosebud to spend their vacation will return here as soon as cool weather sets in.

The Brown Palace has shipping ore in two shafts and is sacking at both places; the leasers on the White Alps are sacking first class ore and will ship as soon as they have a carload; the strike of rich ore made this week in the Dreamland at a depth of 100 feet is the most important event in the history of the camp.

The Western Pacific railway is making rapid progress toward Rosebud and it will be but a short time until ore can be shipped over that road with only a seven or eight mile haul.

There are probably three hundred claims in the district upon which the annual assessment work will be done during the next three months. This work will distribute a large sum of money among the miners and business men of the camp.

As development progresses additions will be made to the forces of men now at work in the mines. Rosebud will be a great mining camp—one of the greatest in the state, but it will not be made in a day. The ore is here, but the mines will be found with depth—not on the surface.

Tuesday the Dreamland struck ore in the 16-foot crosscut that has been run from the bottom of the 100-foot shaft. This is the deepest working in the district in which ore has been opened up. The ore is similar to that found on the surface and in the drift run from the shaft at a depth of forty feet. A sample of the exposed portion of the ledge gave assay returns of more than 100 ounces in silver and about \$4 in gold. Drifts were run diagonally from the shaft in two directions and the one run to the south was the first to encounter the ore. This shows a considerable increase in the size of the shoot as the one found at the 40-foot level was north of the shaft. This level was run a distance of ninety feet and is in ore all the distance.

This strike proves conclusively that the greatest values and the largest bodies of ore in this camp will be found with depth. The development on the Dreamland, under the management of J. B. Harper, has been done in a systematic and miner-like manner, and the discovery of rich ore at a depth of 100 feet means much not only to the fortunate owners of the property, but also to the holders of other claims.

Sacking of high grade ore on the Rosebud Mining and Leasing company's ground on the White Alps continues. The leasers are filling fifteen or twenty sacks of ore per day with only two men at work. A shipment will be made as soon as a carload is taken out.—Humboldt Star.

## PROPERTIES NOW BEING WORKED

### MINES THAT WERE IDLE NOW RUNNING WITH STARTING OF MILL.

[Special to Bonanza.]

MANHATTAN, Sept. 21.—Many properties, for many months idle, are again being worked, now that a local market for mill grade ore is in sight; yet other properties are to be once more developed in the immediate future. Among the latter are the acreages of the Ivanhoe and Manhattan United companies, both of which are backed by California capital. Miss B. M. Wilson, resident agent and manager, returned to camp a few days ago from San Francisco, where she arranged for resumption of ledge exploration. It is the intention to sink a deep main working shaft on the Ivanhoe estate with the object of opening up at water level the ore body tapped in the drift at the 100-foot level. This ledge is well mineralized and presents indications of making into a commercially valuable deposit at depth.

**MANHATTAN UNITED.**  
Development of Manhattan United acreage is to be furthered with the view of opening up the continuation of the rich ledge recently encountered on Original Manhattan ground, adjoining. Surface indications and ledge showing at nominal depth would apparently bespeak the ultimate location of pay ore on this estate even though the continuation of the Original vein system were not encountered within its boundaries.

**WILL INSTALL PUMP.**  
G. E. Stanley, president of the Thanksgiving company, is negotiating for a station pump and Superintendent Mott is preparing for its installation at the 360-foot level of the main working shaft. The present flow of water into the workings is hampering development in the lower levels. However, despite this fact a pump is being made at the 360-foot point and at the 340-foot level a station is being cut. From this level drifts are to be run in both directions on the vein. Test drives, fifteen feet in length, have been made and demonstrate the ledge matter to carry a gold grade on par with that causing the sensation at the 100-foot level. As soon as the company can get action on the lower level it will be but a question of days until ample stopping ground will be afforded.

**SANTA LOLA.**  
Twenty feet of \$16 in gold to the ton ore is being developed in the breast of the Santa Lola company's tunnel, 800 feet in from the portal. The vein matter is a hard, blue lime quartz showing both copper and iron pyrites and carrying a gold grade ranging from \$2.40 to \$42.80 the ton. This ledge, although a contact, is not the King Osear contact for which the company has been driving for a twelvemonth. It will require some 400 feet more of drifting to reach the latter. Work is being pushed with all possible dispatch and under the backing of New York capitalists.

**MANHATTAN O. R. & R. CO.**  
The main building of the Manhattan Ore Reduction and Refining Company is now practically covered with a sheeting of corrugated iron and that phase of the work will be finished within the week. All but two of the fourteen cyanide tanks are now in place and the Butters filter press is erected and ready for business. Interior connections with machinery and other apparatus are about completed. It appears probable that the plant will be in operation within five weeks from date. The pumping plant is in place and has been tested, indicating that a water supply more than double that required for running the plant is available.

**NEVADA PLANT.**  
C. S. Lemon, promoter of and general manager of the plant that the Nevada Ore Reduction Company is erecting on Wolfstone ground, reports rapid progress in mill construction and in placing machinery. The benches have all been cut, masonry foundations built and the carpenters are now engaged in erecting the superstructure. Another carload of machinery arrived late last week. A contract has been awarded for equipping the mill with an electric lighting plant having a capacity for supplying 150 16-candle power incandescents.

**ROSARIO PLANT.**  
A force of masons is engaged in the construction of the foundations for machinery and buildings at the site of the Rosario company's mill on the Black Jack claim. Satisfactory progress is being made and it is expected that work on the superstructure will begin within the week. Messrs. Chapman and Moore, the gentlemen backing the enterprise, state that it is the intention to construct a mill building of sufficient size to permit of the installation of several Huntingtons, other than the

six-foot machine which is to form the primal ore treating equipment.

## TONOPAH AND GOLDFIELD OUTPUT.

The ore shipments over the Tonopah and Goldfield Railroad for the week ending Thursday night aggregated 2323 tons, divided as follows: From Tonopah—Tonopah Company, 1537 tons; Tonopah Extension, 271 tons; Midway, 99 tons; Montana Tonopah, 76 tons; Jim Butler, 72 tons.

From Goldfield—278 tons. The Tonopah Company sent 2440 tons, the Belmont 1450 tons, and the Montana Tonopah 320 tons to the mills, making the total shipments for the week 5960 tons.

The total output of the Tonopah mines was 6265 tons, of an estimated value (the shipping ore being valued at \$70 a ton and the milling ore at \$30 a ton) of \$270,150.

The output of the Goldfield mines for the week, as reported by the Goldfield News, was as follows: Shipped to the smelters, 535 tons, of an average value of \$100 a ton, or a total value of \$53,500.

Shipped to the Nevada-Goldfield Reduction Works, 1314 tons, of an average value of \$125 a ton, or a total value of \$164,250.

Shipped to the Western Ore Purchasing Company at Columbia, 1139 tons, of an estimated value of \$125 a ton, or a total value of \$142,375.

Shipped to the Combination Mill, 504 tons, of an estimated value of \$80 a ton, or a total value of \$40,320.

Grand total of shipments, 3492 tons, having a grand total value of \$400,445.
