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## EXCITEMENT AT NATCHEZ.

New Camp Has a Very Rich Gold Showing.  
J. F. Otis, who is in town from Mill City, speaks in glowing terms of the strike recently made in Barber Canyon, ten miles from that place, which is the scene of considerable excitement.  
The new district has been formally organized and named Natchez, which is also the name of the townsite which has been laid out. There are now about fifty people in the camp and there are new arrivals daily.  
"I looked the camp over pretty well," said Mr. Otis, "and there is certainly a very rich gold showing. I saw ore from many different claims that was just covered with gold. About 100 claims have been located in the camp and most of the locators are doing the cinch work."  
Mr. Otis was one of the lucky ones and located a group of claims close in. Ore from one of his claims, which he showed to a representative of the Star, showed plenty of gold.  
R. Walther, the original discoverer, has bonded his group of claims to Tonopah people and it is understood that extensive work will be started on this property soon.  
Frank Grimmon and Tom American are taking out extremely rich ore. Messrs. Green and Scott and other parties are working valuable placer deposits in the canyon.  
Mr. and Mrs. McCarthy, who were among the first to reach the scene after Walther's strike was reported, were fortunate in getting some valuable ground. Mrs. McCarthy, who is famed as a woman prospector, has found ore on the claims which she located that is fully as rich as that discovered by Walther.  
Charles Nofsinger, who has returned to Winnemucca from a trip to Barber Canyon, says there is plenty of gold there and the new camp looks like a winner. He located a promising group of claims.—Humboldt Star.

## HAS GOOD ORE.

### Georgimac Mine Has Shown Showing Value of \$100.

What is fast proving to be the big mine of the Gold Run district is the Georgimac property, under the management of Jesse Taylor. The drift from the 50-foot shaft is now in 35 feet, crosscutting the big dyke. For ten feet the drift has been in quartz that is showing good gold values and Saturday the miners broke into what is thought to be the same shoot of ore that was uncovered on the surface that assayed high in gold. Panings from the face of the crosscut would indicate values of from \$75 to \$100 to the ton in gold.  
At the present time two shafts are working on the property and it is the intention of Mr. Taylor to resume work in the shaft and it will be sunk to the 100-foot level, where another drift will be started to crosscut the ledge. In the bottom of the shaft, at a depth of 50 feet, samples taken from drillings assayed \$74 to the ton in gold.  
That the Georgimac is a great property is becoming more apparent with each day's work. The property, under Mr. Taylor's management, is in good hands, and it is the company's intention to do deep mining, with the most flattering chances of developing the Georgimac into one of the State's really great mines.  
J. H. Elling, the secretary of the Georgimac company, came down from the property Sunday and will leave this evening on a trip to the southern Nevada mining camps and San Francisco. He is very much pleased with the outlook, after having made an exhaustive examination of the company's holdings in the district.—Humboldt Star.

## LEASES GETTING NEXT TO THE ORE

Cyrus E. Johnson, one of the old-timers of the camp, returned from the east Sunday. It was Cy Johnson who took the first lease on the famous Daisy property directly after Round Mountain was discovered a little over a year ago. And it is Cy Johnson who today is managing and operating two of the gilt edged leases of the camp. The Crescent lease on the Daisy is a Johnson flotation and they are now down over a hundred feet with one of the best shafts of the district. A power hoist has been installed and work is progressing with two shifts of men.

Mr. Johnson's visit east was for the purpose of promoting a mining and leasing company to take over the "Slim" Morgan Daisy lease, adjoining the famous Munholland lease, which took out in the neighborhood of \$100,000 in less than a year. The Solid Gold Mining and Leasing company is the result of his efforts. Its officers and directors are E. C. Webb, capitalists, of Hartford, Conn., president; Cy Johnson, vice president and general manager; C. A. Woody, president of Hartford Mining Exchange, secretary and treasurer; Robert P. Lyons and J. E. Inman, of Hartford, additional directors. Mr. Inman is expected out in a few days and after his inspection of the property it is the intention to install a power hoist at once and begin sinking on the ore body, which has been exposed in two places. A 100-foot shaft is already down on the property and in every foot of the way. From this shaft came some of the finest specimen gold of the district and it is hard to estimate just how much has been taken out in the past few months. Further up the hillside on the same lease, the vein has again been exposed and an assay taken reveals a gold value of \$385 to the ton. The Solid Gold company surely has one of the very best leasing propositions in camp and one that may some day make even the lucky leasers of the great Goldfield sit up and take notice.

Mr. Johnson's father accompanied him to Round Mountain and expresses himself as well pleased at recent developments on Daisy hill. The elder Johnson is interested in both the Crescent and Solid Gold companies with his son.  
Mr. A. Cahn, a capitalist, of New Orleans, and one of the heavy stockholders in the Crescent company, is in Round Mountain and after making a tour of inspection of several mines of the camp, has expressed himself as most happily surprised at what he found. Speaking of the Daisy leases Mr. Cahn said that he believed they were really the cream of the district and in his belief he will find many Round Mountain people to concur with him.

Mr. Cahn is a prominent attorney of New Orleans and is attorney for the Crescent company. It is his intention now to remain in Round Mountain about a week and size up the camp and district in as thorough a manner as possible. As the gentleman said what impressed him most since his arrival here was the lack of stock jobbing propositions being operated in Round Mountain. As he put it "everyone here seems to have confidence in the camp. They are miners, not brokers, and are putting up their good, hard cash for the purpose of developing their ground. The good reports I heard at Goldfield, Tonopah and Manhattan concerning Round Mountain, brought me here in a very sanguine humor and I must say that I have not been in the least disappointed. Seeing is believing and I want to be counted in the front rank of the believers."  
Supt. Wm. Mattley of the Crescent lease expects to put a crew of men at work crosscutting at the 100 foot level, where it is expected the Madison and Fairview ledges will be encountered. Sulphides have been present in the shaft for the past few days and, while the assay returns are small, they are hopeful.

The Crescent Mining and Leasing company is a close corporation and is being financed by a coterie of wealthy New Orleans capitalists.—Round Mountain Nugget.

## VACCINE REMEDY FOR TUBERCULOSIS

LONDON, Sept. 25.—"In the near future, in my opinion, we shall vaccinate as effectively against tuberculosis and typhoid fever as we now vaccinate against smallpox," said Dr. C. Bass of New Orleans this morning. This brilliant young investigator made the statement after a season of observation at St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington, where a whole wing of the institution has been

turned over to Sir Almroth Edward Wright, the famous pathologist and bacteriologist, for experiments in therapeutic inoculation. Dr. Bass goes from London to Oxford and Cambridge for a period in the laboratories of these institutions and for consultation with his friend, Professor Osler, who keeps in close touch with all forms of medical progress.  
"Dr. Wright's discoveries," continued Dr. Bass, "are slowly but surely forcing their way to the front. They have been retarded somewhat because of the fact that they did not emanate from Germany. But now Germans are taking up Dr. Wright's ideas."

## POPE ORDERS CONVENTS CLOSED

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—A cable dispatch to the Sun from Rome says the attention of the pope is now directed toward the excessive number of religious houses in Rome, especially convents for nuns, many of whom received orders without the statutory dotation, thus burdening the scanty resources of the community.  
The pope has not only decided to refuse permits for the establishment of new convents, but is inclined to suppress some of the existing institutions and order the nuns to return to their families.  
The vatican is determined not to grant further pecuniary assistance to needy religious communities.

## LABOR LEADER IS RAVING MANIAC

SEATTLE, Sept. 25.—A. E. Fowler, secretary of the Japanese-Korean Exclusion League, who went to Vancouver to address a labor demonstration the night that the Vancouver riots occurred in the Asiatic colony, is a raving maniac in the Bellingham jail. He has been held there for several days and on Saturday was given a short hearing before Judge Kellogg. At that time it was thought he was merely unstrung by overwork or worry, and would recover, so the court sent him back to jail. Since then Fowler has become violent.

Fowler has kept up a constant wild harangue on the imaginary Japanese invasion. The officers could not divert his mind. Last night he divested himself of all his clothing and pranced up and down his cell like an Indian. Sheriff Williams tried to calm him. Fowler wrenched off the legs of a cot in his cell and with one in each hand threatened to kill everyone in sight. He kept up such a noise that no person in the courthouse could sleep until Sheriff Williams decided to put him in a cell by himself.
