

CHARMED WITH UBEHEBE MINES

Harry J. Litt of Portland, Ore., arrived here from Ubehebe yesterday morning, accompanied by Ray Baker and Valentine Hush. Mr. Litt spent two days in the Ubehebe district and came back to Tonopah to add his tribute to the splendors of the copper deposits of the southern country. Mr. Litt went to Ubehebe, representing himself and a number of people of Portland, who are interested in the Ubehebe Copper Mines and Smelter Company.

"I was satisfied," said he, "that there was a great prospect, after the report of Mr. Greenley, who preceded me to the district, but I wanted to see for myself. Mr. Greenley is one of the acknowledged copper experts of the United States, and he made a thorough technical examination of the property, but there is no report that you can read in cold type that will give you an adequate idea of what there is to be seen.

"The property showed up in far better shape than my greatest expectations led me to anticipate. I went down Tuesday morning, and had plenty of time to make a thorough inspection of the mines. I do not believe that there is such another showing in the world, for the amount of development that has been done. There are cuts and tunnels and shafts, where you can see the copper ore, and there is some of it which is almost pure. One can travel over the holdings of the Salsberry company all day long and still find more copper.

"In fact, a day's inspection is not sufficient, and I was there for two days, and then did not see all that there was to be seen. The mining can be done for a comparatively small cost, cheaper than any other mining that I can now recall, and the shipment from the mine will be another easy matter, for there are all the facilities for transportation in reach. The railroad from the mines to Bonnie Claire can be constructed in good time, and for as little expense as any railroad in this country.

"I am familiar with most of the copper camps, all the large camps from Valdez, Alaska, to Mexico, and feel safe in saying that the Ubehebe district, when fully developed, will stand second to none in the country."

Attorney Cleveland Baker returned from Portland yesterday, and it was he who first interested Mr. Litt in Ubehebe. Since that time he has talked to many others in Portland, and he says that there will be a party come here from the northwest in a special car about the first of December. Mr. Baker says that financial matters in the northwest are in splendid condition, and that there has been very little worry in consequence of the stringency in the market.


