MORAN-ATTELL FIGHT A DRAW

Ring Battle of Champions Was One That Warmed the Hearts of Spectators.

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 1.—Owen Moran, champion featherweight of England, made a draw fight of twenty-five rounds with Abe Attell, champion of America, who was thought invincible at that weight.

The Fight By Rounds

Round 1—They shook hands. Attell leading first with left. Attell sent a light left to the face.

Round 2—Attell came up smiling. He missed left lead and then jabbed left to the face. Moran missed left hook for the stomach, then brought two lefts to his opponent's face.

Round 3—Moran sent Attell up against the ropes with a left hook to the stomach and they wrestled to the center of the ring.

Round 4—Attell jabbed left to the face and they hugged each other. Attell claiming that Moran was holding. Moran missed right and left for the face and Attell swung his left lightly to the head.

Round 5—They sparred for half a minute and Abe jabbed left to the face. Then followed a mix, Moran getting his right to the head.

Round 6—Attell whipped two vicious lefts to the jaw and then sent two lefts in quick succession to the body.

Round 7—Attell eluded several vicious onslaughts by the Briton and stabbed Moran with left on the face.

Round 8—Attell opened with a right cross to the head. Moran then swung a hard right over the kidneys.

Round 9—Attell opened with a right cross to the head. Moran then swung a hard right over the kidneys. Attell then swung right to the jaw and Moran countered with a straight left to the face.
