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## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### DEFINE PUBLIC DEMAND.

Another twenty-four hours have elapsed, and the County Commissioners have not appointed the desired and required number of extra deputies to properly police the city. At this time, when there is a crying need for more deputy sheriffs and more guards, when the taxpayers are demanding that the life and property of the community be better protected from the crooks and thugs who are sure to come from Goldfield, County Commissioners McQuillan and Cuddy are doing nothing. There will be a meeting of the board on Monday next, and if nothing happens in the interim, why, well and good. That will be an argument for the supineness of the Commissioners.

Thanks to the efficiency of the men under Sheriff Owens and Chief of Police Malley, we have enjoyed a reign of peace in Tonopah, while Goldfield was the scene of holdups, safe-cracking exploits and robberies. But there is a wide field here to cover, and the small force of officers cannot be in all places at the same time. That there are bad men in town, we know, and the police are doing good work in rounding up hard characters each night, and Judge Brissell is supplementing their work by sending the suspicious characters to the rock pile, or running them out of the country.

But how long the good work may be effective, no one can tell. We do not know the night that the crooks may get in here in forces too large for our small force to handle. Should this happen, and should there be any more crimes committed in this community, the people know where the responsibility rests.

## THAW'S SISTER SEEKS DIVORCE

### COUNTESS OF YARMOUTH WANTS SHACKLES OF NOBILITY SUNDERED.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—Countess Yarmouth, who was Alice Thaw of Pittsburg, daughter of Mrs. William Thaw and sister of Harry Thaw, whose second trial for the murder of Stanford White begins next Monday in New York city, applied today to the divorce court for the annulment of her marriage to Earl Yarmouth. The court ordered the proceedings to be held behind closed doors and the papers in the case are being kept secret. The only inkling obtainable of the charge preferred is a statement to the effect that the nature of the medical evidence to be given makes a public hearing inadvisable.

## OPENED WEAK CLOSED STRONG

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—The course of today's stock market was a succession of backings and fillings, reflecting the uncertain feelings of the professional element, which was concerned most in the dealings. Early in the day these were the factors of depression given most weight to, in the discussion on the floor of stock exchange, although the active weakness of Northern Pacific probably had as much effect on prices in general as any larger development in affairs. This stock was the market leader yesterday and those who bought it then on the assurance that a large extra dividend would be immediately forthcoming, apparently had misgivings today and sold out. Call loan rates went no higher than 10 per cent today, and from that level receded easily. The stock market turned very strong after the estimates of currency movement appeared. Bonds were firm.

## DIAMOND DRILL FINDS \$35 ORE

A rich belt of gold-bearing quartz is being prospected along Bishop Creek, Inyo county, Cal., with excellent results. A nine-foot vein of ore assaying \$35 a ton has been struck at a depth of 60 feet by a diamond drill. The find is considered of the utmost importance, and from present indications, a rich property is likely to be developed. The discovery has caused considerable interest throughout the district, and a rush has been made to locate claims around the scene of the strike. The belt where the discovery was made is well defined, and is reported to be over a mile wide, and has been traced for an extensive distance. Local people have located claims in the most prominent places, and are energetically prospecting their holdings.

The discoveries of silver-lead ore in the White mountains has caused a rush to that section, and a new camp is being established near the center of the district. The original claims are being developed on an intelligent scale, and the rich ledges are showing well with limited depth. A large number of locations have been made near the scene of the original strike, and many of the first arrivals are wildly enthusiastic over the richness and extent of the ore bodies.

A seven-foot ledge running from \$16 to \$83 per ton is being developed in the Black Canyon mine, near Bishop, Cal. The ledge outcrops on the surface, and has been traced for 1500 feet. Selected samples of the ore runs \$150 per ton, and the ledge gives excellent indications of permanency. A tunnel has been driven into the giant dyke, and has exposed some excellent ore. Several smaller ledges are being prospected with encouraging results. The vein system is believed to be the same as that traversing the Cerro Gordo and Southern Belle mines, between which the Black Canyon is located. The management contemplates the installation of a modern mill at an early date, as it is considered that sufficient ore is now in sight to justify such a step.

Operations are steadily progressing at the Copper Queen group, the Schwab property at Greenwater, but important results are not expected until a depth of 1000 feet has been attained. The shaft is going down as rapidly as it can be driven, and the 50-horse power hoist is taxed to its utmost capacity to handle the work carried on. At the Copper Blue, owned by the Clark interests of Spokane, sinking has been suspended until the 50-horse power hoist can be installed. Some promising ore is being developed in the Saratoga Red Box, but sufficient depth has not been attained to demonstrate the continuance of the ore body. Several other claims in the district are being developed on a small scale with good results.—Denver Mining Record.
