THE SOLID GOLD LEASE A MARVEL

The wonderfully rich ore that is being sacked from the Solid Gold lease on the property of the Round Mountain Daisy Mining Company continues without abatement.

A visit to the mine will convince the most skeptical that in this property the owners have a veritable bonanza. By passing a candle along the walls of the various crosscuts and drifts which are being worked at the present time, particles of wire gold may be seen adhering on all sides. Pockets of wire gold are encountered every day which are extracted by hand with the aid of the ordinary prospector's pick.

The Messrs. Johnson, father and son, who are personally on the ground and watching over their own and associates' interests, are enthusiastic over the rare showings which are constantly coming to light.

"Cy" Johnson is still in the East and advice received from him indicate that money is gradually loosening and that the mill for the ground is practically an assured fact. Meanwhile, until milling facilities are at hand, only the high grade which can be sacked, will be taken out.—Round Mountain Nugget.

SUSPECT CASE OF FOUL PLAY

RENO, Jan. 7.—J. H. Driscoll, chief clerk at the Nevada Insane Asylum, this afternoon at 3:20 o'clock notified Coroner Bell that the asylum attendants had found the body of an unknown man floating in a ditch at the asylum. The man's body was removed from the ditch and held at the asylum until Coroner Bell could take charge of it. It is believed that the man was foully dealt with and that his body was then thrown into the ditch to cover up the crime.

JACK THE RIPPER.

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—Another Jack the Ripper crime was committed last night in the suburb of Charlottenburg. A little girl, four years old, was enticed into a hallway of a house and fatally stabbed in the abdomen. She was injured in exactly the same manner as that employed by a man who last July startled the city by a series of stabbings on young children.

DISCOVER NEW PLACER GROUND

The discovery of placer ground in the vicinity of Silver Point is the latest news of importance which has to do with this district.

On the acreage of the Royal Hawaiian Extension Mining Company, Vice President James M. Cordray has found surface dirt, which in various places went \$3.20, \$2.80 and \$7.20 to the yard.

This ground is about three miles to the south and west of Round Mountain and the possibilities which the discovery opens up is impossible of estimation.

That it will renew the activity in the search for placer ground it is needless to say. How much more auriferous ground there is in the immediate neighborhood of Round Mountain only prospecting and the future can determine.

Steady and consistent work has been in progress in the Silver Point vicinity and it has had its ample reward.

Six separate and distinct ledges have been uncovered on the group of four claims owned by the Gold Hill Consolidated Mining Company. Two assays returns from the office of Wm. Berg, which were seen by the Nugget representative, gave the following results:

Gold \$11.20, silver 610 ounces, total \$419.90; gold \$1.80, silver 200 ounces, total \$135.80.

There are a number of shafts and tunnels which were abandoned many years ago, and these Mr. Cordray, who is president of the company, has had men at work on opening up with the result previously mentioned.

In the breast of one tunnel, at about thirty feet, a four-foot ledge was broken into, while a three-foot ledge was cut in the bottom of a thirty-five-foot shaft. It is from these two places that the assays given above were obtained.

Several rich seams and stringers run through these ore bodies, which assayed into the three figures. The other ore bodies encountered are low grade milling propositions, which average from seven to ten dollars throughout as far as has been determined.

The Gold Hill Consolidated Mining Company is rich in its own right, being owned by an association of San Francisco capitalists with the following officers: President, James M. Cordray; vice-president, Cleve Pickrell; secretary, Chas. Pickrell, and treasurer, James M. Cordray.

The main office is in San Francisco and Mr. Cordray intends making a trip to that city in the near future, when he will bring up matters in connection with their construction of a mill which is now being contemplated. Applications are in for the use of the waters of both Jet creek in the Toyabe range and Mariposa creek in the Toiyabe range, the former necessitating the piping of the water the entire distance across Big Smokey valley. It is Mr. Cordray's intention to apply the water for the generation of electric power which will be used to work the mill.

No definite plans are as yet formulated, but Mr. Cordray is authority for the statement that there is little doubt that the mill will be put up sometime during the course of the next twelve months.

If further developments reveal the fact that there is any great quantity of workable placer ground, the piping of the water will at least be an assured fact, as the sluicing and hydraulic methods, which have been so successfully applied by the Round Mountain Hydraulic Company, will be used.

Mr. Cordray is an experienced and conservative mining man and that he is enthusiastic about the possibilities of his two great properties goes without saying. The Nugget representative was shown over the ground and that Mr. Cordray has reason for his great faith in the ground was amply proven.—Round Mountain Nugget.

NOT LEGALLY MARRIED.

WILL BE SHY AN ASSEMBLYMAN

A very important item regarding the recent call of Governor Sparks for a special convening of the Legislature was forgotten in Humboldt county. The leaders in both parties began to count their strength in both houses, when it was discovered that the county will be one member short in the Assembly, this being caused by the resignation of Assemblyman Davey from this county several months ago. In looking into the matter it was discovered that at the time he was desirous of taking a position in the county clerk's office and under advice from Governor Sparks regarding the statutes, handed in his resignation, which was duly accepted.

As yet no one has been appointed to fill the vacancy, and as it is too late to hold a special election for that purpose, as well as grave doubts having arisen regarding the power of the governor to appoint some one to fill the vacancy, it will at this time place Humboldt county in a peculiar as well as awkward position, with one representative short in this—one of the most important meetings of the legislative body of the State.

As the absent member was one of the committee on military and Indian affairs of the Assembly, to which all matters regarding the retention of troops in Goldfield will be referred to before being acted upon by the lower house, Humboldt county will, to a certain extent, lose some of the prestige due to it by the negligence of those in power by not seeing this vacancy filled at the time it took place. Of course at the time nobody thought that the present call would be forthcoming, but it is a lesson to be remembered in the future.—Reno Gazette.


