

## EXTENT OF THE DACITE INTRUSION

MARK B. KERR IS AT WORK ON AN IMPORTANT PROJECT.

Mark B. Kerr, consulting engineer for a number of properties in the camp, has been inspecting these properties, and will be at the work for several days yet. Mr. Kerr is engaged at the present time in the most important work that was ever known in the camp, that of determining the extent of the dacite intrusion, which has been of so much worry to the camp, and to the stockholders outside of the camp. In fact, the Eastern stockholders have been more worried than the people in the camp.

The important work is going on in the lower levels of the Midway and the Montana Tonopah, where in each mine there has been encountered below the dacite, an ore body, and both bodies are very promising.

"On the Midway," said Mr. Kerr, "below the 800 level we are following a contact on the edge of one of these dacite tongues, and with greater depth, it seems favorable that the ore will improve in value. At the first station, one hundred feet below the 800 level, the adjoining quartz body will be prospected, but this will not interfere with the continuous sinking. At another 100 feet, prospecting will be again continued, and it is hoped to obtain higher values by this work."

"The Montana Tonopah will soon resume prospecting at depth on their lowest ore body, the character of which is closely allied to this ore body in the Midway."

## WILL PRODUCE "PASSION PLAY"

## MARCO MILICH AS INTERPRETER

SUES FOR MONEY DUE HIM FROM THE BOYOVICH BROTHERS.

Milich acted as interpreter for the Boyovich brothers when their brother was being tried for obtaining goods under false representations, and he said that they promised him \$60 for his services. When the brother was sentenced to the penitentiary for three and a half years, the brothers concluded that the case was over, and refused to pay Milich. Judge Brissell, before whom the case was tried yesterday, gave the judgment above referred to. The lawyer's fee was \$50, and the costs were near that amount.

## TAKING OUT HIGH GRADE.

Three shifts—in all twelve men—are working on the Davis-Shea lease on Dexter Union 9. Monday there was \$1500 worth of ore taken from these lease workings. The ore runs from \$200 to \$1500 per ton in gold, and as much of this as possible will be brought to the surface, every available place for a man being filled.

Drifts are being run on the rich pay streak at both the fifty and the 100 foot levels. At places the stopes have followed the rich ore to the grass roots and to daylight. The streak varies in width from four inches to one foot.

The leasers are now arranging for a hoist, and as soon as this is installed a shaft will be sunk to the water level, where it is believed richer and larger bodies of ore are waiting to be tapped.

## ROSEBUD RAPIDLY FORGING AHEAD

FINANCIAL PANIC HAVING GONE BY ALL PROPERTIES ARE RESUMING WORK.

Walter L. O'Neill, superintendent of the Rosebud Extension and the Saw Tooth Galena King Mining companies, was in the city yesterday, and will leave for Rosebud this morning. The properties are owned and controlled by Irving K. Farrington & Co., of New York, and are of the few on which work was continued during the stress of hard times.

"Rosebud has been quiet like nearly every other district in the State," said Mr. O'Neill. "Besides our properties, work has been going on in the Springfield and Durango Girl, and preparations are being made for the resumption of work on other excellent properties, now that the financial panic has passed. Nearly every holder in Rosebud made good on the annual assessment work, and there are very few properties open to location."

"With the little surface work that has been done on the Galena King, and with the shaft down only forty feet, we have taken out eight tons of ore that will go over a hundred dollars a ton. This we have had ready to ship for some time, but decided not to do so on account of smelter conditions. They have made a strike on the Durango Girl, which is near the old Nevada Sulphur Company's mine, which has been working for the last forty years. The strike was made on a drift, and a lead was developed which runs from sixty ounces in silver up into the picture values."

"On the Springfield property, which is controlled by Chicago interests, they are continually getting rich pannings, and are now driving in a tunnel for 130 feet to catch the ledge. George Copley and other of the stockholders of the White Alps, have taken a lease on that property, and the leasers are going to begin operations on a big scale. It is generally conceded that a little work will bring them into shipping ore. When the company ceased operations for some unknown reason they were in ore that went upwards of \$85 a ton."

"The grading on the Western Pacific has been completed, and the road passes within three miles of the Saw Tooth and five miles of Rosebud. The company has promised to lay its tracks as soon as the weather will permit."  
"I have not had an opportunity of getting into Rawhide, but I hear of the camp wherever I go. They are full of it in Reno, and they talked of nothing else coming in on the train. It looks, from all I can hear, as if it were going to make a great camp."
