## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### LOOKS GOOD FOR ALL NEVADA.

Manhattan has again slipped into the limelight with one of the most sensational discoveries of the day. Manhattan has two mills in operation, another nearly completed, and a fourth, the machinery of which arrived in the camp yesterday. Add on top of this comes the discovery on the Rose-Nash lease on Union No. 4 of ore that goes from \$4 to \$6 a pound, from \$8000 to \$12,000 a ton.

Frank Peterson and his associates have completed the deal, whereby they are to take over the Stray Dog, Indian Camp and the Jumping Jack on a five-year lease; and in addition, have bought outright the control of the Wolf mill. These gentlemen will put money into the camp, and will set things in motion. On Thursday, there were shipped to the mill from the Lemon mill a lot of gold bullion, amounting to 521 ounces. This came from the Shea lease on the Dexter property, and another brick of 70 ounces was brought into town from another lease on the same property.

This looks good for Manhattan, and it looks good for all Nevada. A new strike in Manhattan, a big boom in Rawhide, and another rush to Marvel, which is just over the line in California. There is plenty of capital waiting for chances like these. Capital is just as anxious to have something to work upon, as the people who find good things are anxious to have capital to work them. Show capital something good, and capital will come to it. This is just what Nevada is doing at present, and it is only a matter of a short time when the money market will loosen up for the very reason that the gold discoveries of Nevada are calling to it.

The day for the wildcat has gone by in this State, and the wildcatter has gone with it. A man argues himself a fool to be caught by a wildcat, when there are so many good things open to him. The discoveries mean for Nevada one of the greatest years in its history, greater prosperity than we have ever known.

### ELY SEES GREAT POSSIBILITIES.

The country which future railroad building will make tributary to this camp is of great scope and of boundless wealth. It includes Goldfield and Tonopah, old Hamilton and hundreds upon hundreds of miles of country in which the prospector has found conditions favorable to the development of great mineral wealth as soon as the aid of rail comes to his hand. Beyond Goldfield and Tonopah are Greenwater, Lee and many other districts which have had advantage of the expenditure of considerable money and have made good to the extent of development they have had. All these will within the next five years center their production in the hands of Cumberland Ely and Nevada Consolidated reduction works at McGill. It will be their nearest point and at it they will have advantage of the best conditions possible for recovery of all the values coming to them, at the least cost for transportation of their ores. The greatest mining, smelting and mining supply center west of Denver is the certain outcome here.—White Pine News.

## RAWHIDE THEME OF DISCUSSION

STORIES OF RICH FINDS STIRS THE ENTHUSIASM OF EVERYBODY.

Rawhide was again the principal theme of discussion in the camp yesterday, for the stories brought back from the land of gold by the Kendall party fired the enthusiasm of everybody who read them, and there are a number of parties going out today and tomorrow, weather permitting.

Besides Messrs. Kendall, Govan, Thatcher and Dougherty, there also arrived from Rawhide on Thursday night, E. J. Collins, engineer for Malcolm Macdonald; Paul Tarpey and Round Mountain Scotty. Every one of this party had good things to say for the camp and added his indorsement to what had been said for it by those who came before.

The Grutt lease has turned out to be another wonder of the camp. There are fourteen inches on the hanging wall which go \$365 to the ton, and the eighteen inches next to this goes \$50 to the ton. The values in this are principally in gold.

Zeb Kendall and his party, at least Roger Dougherty, will go back to Rawhide tomorrow. W. W. Booth of the Daily Bonanza, and new proprietor of the Rawhide Rustler, will also be one of a party leaving tomorrow for the land of promise. This morning, Key Pittman and a party will leave for Rawhide, and Al Revert of the Tonopah Lumber Company will pilot another party, provided that the weather holds fair. Mr. Revert is going to Rawhide to look over the ground, and will in all probability establish a branch of his lumber company there. Dave Holland is another who is booked for Rawhide tomorrow, and he will probably put in a branch of the Tonopah Liquor Company. There is getting to be quite a colony of Tonopah people in Rawhide, and the chances are that it will be swelled before the month is completed.

## NEW MILL FOR RAWHIDE CAMP

M. Ediams of Rawhide is in this city for a few days. He is here looking after the shipment of the Garwood stamp mill. He reports the young camp improving as depth is attained and enough milling ore in sight to keep a 15-stamp mill in operation for two years.

The mill will be located about two miles southeast of Rawhide and water will be piped from the desert to the mill.

This will necessitate only a short haul of the ore from the mines to the mill.—State Journal.


