### PECULIAR SHOOTING IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Hugh Hollis, a treasury department clerk, who came here from Louisville, Ky., and served for a time as private secretary to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, shot and killed his wife early today.

Hollis procured a revolver a day or two ago and practiced shooting it yesterday. About 3 o'clock in the morning his wife arose to attend their child and as she returned to the bedside, Hollis awakened, pulled the revolver from beneath his pillow and fired, instantly killing the woman. Immediately he went to sleep again and knew nothing of the shooting until he was afterward awakened. He has always borne an excellent reputation and he declares he was dreaming of burglars.

RAWHIDE PROPERTY HAS FIFTY TONS OF ORE FOR SALT LAKE.

### EVELYN THAW TO REVEAL ORGIES

PITTSBURG, Pa., March 14.—Evelyn Nesbit Thaw is prepared to make astounding revelations concerning the life of her husband, Harry Kendall Thaw, if he persists in his determination to oppose her divorce suit or if the Thaw family proves recalcitrant in granting the financial settlement she desires. Her friends declare that she has unearthed escapades of Thaw that may rival in interest the orgies of the famous Stanford White tower.

Strangest of all the disclosures made since Mrs. Thaw began suit for the annulment of her marriage to Thaw is the declaration that within a month after her wedding she discovered that he was insane.

At that time she announced her intention of applying for a divorce on the ground that he was crazy before the ceremony and that all members of the Thaw family knew it when they allowed her to wed him. Evelyn Thaw knew nothing about these escapades at the time, but immediately after her marriage Thaw now and then dropped remarks that opened her eyes.

She concluded that no man in his right mind could think of such affairs, much less participate in them; hence her conclusion that Thaw was insane. Evelyn Thaw says she is prepared to prove all this should occasion require.

### HE SOLD LIQUOR TO THE INDIANS

JURY FINDS WILLIAM NIBLITT GUILTY AND RECOMMENDS MERCY.

In the District Court yesterday afternoon William Niblitt, charged with selling liquor to Indians, was found guilty. In submitting the verdict the jury recommended that the court be lenient on account of the extreme age of the defendant. The jury was out only about twenty minutes.

### GOLD BAR IS NOW A PRODUCER

RHYOLITE, March 14.—The Gold Bar has entered the list of Bullfrog producers. The first gold from the new mill which was started in operation a short time ago was brought in the other day and deposited in one of the Rhyolite banks. It was in the form of amalgam and valued at \$2000. It was only a partial clean-up of the plates, however, and for a run of only a few days. A complete clean-up will not be made for some time. The full capacity of the mill is 50 tons a day, and it is treating now about 40, with an extraction, the management says, of 86 per cent.

Ore which will average between \$400 and \$500 to the ton in gold is being taken out of the Dreyer lease on the National Bank. The rich streak is eight inches in width and was uncovered at grass roots. E. W. Dreyer, the lessee, is sacking the ore for shipment. In a shaft above the present workings he has four feet of \$50 milling ore.

The Baigalupi-Logland lease on the National Bank is yielding high gold returns, and the Sparling mill installed to treat the National Bank dump has just started operations. All this activity is on Ladd Mountain immediately east of Rhyolite.

### AFTER HARRIMAN TO GIVE UP PROFITS

NEW YORK, March 14.—Charges that E. H. Harriman has caused a loss to the stockholders of the Union Pacific railroad of more than \$40,000,000 by his stock speculations, were filed with the board of directors today. A formal demand was made that suit be brought against him and the other directors of the system who have been parties to his speculations to recover the sums lost to the company through these alleged illegal transactions.

The papers were served at noon today upon Alexander Millar, secretary of the Union Pacific railroad, by a representative of Leonard M. Wolstein, a lawyer of No. 49 Wall street, on behalf of Lewis A. Stowe and Henry R. Buck of Hartford, Conn.; William A. Arnold of Wilton, Conn., and Albert C. Bates of East Granby, Conn., all stockholders of record.

The action is preliminary to a suit to be instituted by a powerful group of stock holders to force Harriman to disgorge the profits he and his associates are alleged to have made in stock market operations with Union Pacific funds and through the alleged unloading of a large amount of securities of other corporations upon the company's treasury at prices far above their present value.

The action is designed to forestall the plan of the Union Pacific executive committee to segregate these securities under a holding company, which is now being formed for the purpose.
