**SAYS RAWHIDE IS BEST OF ALL**

**KEY PITTMAN RETURNS FROM VISITS TO ALL NEW CAMPS.**

Key Pittman, who has just returned from an extended tour of the various mining camps now in the limelight, notably Rawhide, Gold Circle, Mountain View and other northern camps, says that he thinks Rawhide the best of all. Considerable attention is now being paid Mountain View which is situated south of Yerrington. It has a wide mineral area and leasers are doing well. At Rawhide the rush is on greater than ever.

"I am more than satisfied that Rawhide will be one of the greatest camps in the state," said Mr. Pittman. "The values are increasing with depth, and the property owners are sinking as fast as men and money can do it. Capital is coming in and the investor will be shortly reimbursed for what money he puts in."

**SELECT SITE FOR MILL.**

The site for the big mill which is to be erected by Thomas Kearns and his associates in Kearns lease No. 2, was selected this morning and the work of surveying the ground will be commenced right away. The hoist for the lease has been ordered, and is now on the way in.

"We are going to rush things in the camp a little," said Mr. Kearns this morning. "The work of putting up the mill will be under the supervision of L. M. King of San Francisco, who is here now, and who is prepared to rush the work to the limit. The mill will have a capacity of 200 tons a day and, to begin with, we will put up a 50-ton plant, and begin the work of reduction as soon as that is ready, and will, meanwhile, continue the construction of the rest of the plant."

"We are going to put up a 25-horse power hoist on Kearns No. 2, and as soon as we have it going in shape, will go right ahead increasing the power until we have it up to 15. We have also ordered a hoist for the Miller lease, and both hoists should be on the ground now."

"The pumps and machinery for the water works plant has been ordered, and will be shipped here with all possible speed. Everything connected with the plant but the pipe has been contracted for, and that is to be bid for. This plant is for the town supply as well as for the use of the mill, and will be used, of course, for fighting fire. We have selected the site on the ground of Kearns lease No. 1 for two reservoirs which will have a capacity each of 250,000 gallons. The cost of the water works will be \$145,000, and the management of the works will be in the hands of Arthur Philbrick, the engineer, who has been engaged at a salary of \$1000 a month." **KIND'S HARD LUCK.**

The saddest man in the camp today is J. C. Kind, who was one of the men that bought the control of the Royal Tiger before the boom had come to Rawhide. When A. M. Gillespie went to Tonopah to make the sale, Mr. Kind was one of the first men he met, and to him he unfolded the proposition he had in hand. Mr. Gillespie told what there was in the Royal Tiger and showed samples and assays that had come from the Stinson lease on the Royal claim. Mr. Kind couldn't get the money quick enough for the purchase of 100,000 shares.

On Monday last Mr. Kind optioned his holdings in the Royal Tiger to Attorney George B. Thatcher, and on Thursday the biggest strike yet made in the camp was made on the Tiger claim. Mr. Kind wrung his hands and tore his hair. Here was one of the biggest leases in the camp at work on the Royal claim, and now the Tiger had made good with sensational values, and with the indications that the ore would be permanent, and Kind had no more interest in the Royal Tiger than a jack rabbit.

Had he been up to see the strike? Not he. He was going away, and wanted no more of the camp. He didn't want to see the strike. He was sorry there was a strike. No; he would take that back. He was sorry that the strike had not occurred a week sooner; sorry that he had not had the sublime confidence in the hill that the rest of the people who knew more about mining than he had evinced.

But it was different with Attorney George B. Thatcher. He would not sell his newly-acquired holdings for twice what they cost him. Mr. Thatcher is interested in the Bushwhacker, which adjoins the Tiger,

**SPHINX MILL IS NEARLY READY**

**ROUND MOUNTAIN PLANT WILL SOON BEGIN TURNING OUT BULLION.**

Henry Bartlett, of the Round Mountain Nugget, came over from Goldfield yesterday on his way home to Round Mountain. In speaking of the Round Mountain district yesterday Mr. Bartlett said:

"We have one of the most wonderful camps in the state and one that is continually producing the goods. Shipments of bullion are being made regular and that alone speaks volumes for the camp. The Round Mountain Mining company will soon increase their output from 75 tons to 100 tons daily and that will increase the returns from \$30,000 to \$40,000 a month, and it will not be long before that will be doubled. The Sphinx mill soon starts up and that will offer employment to a large number of men. There are now about 250 men employed there now, outside of the leasers, and the amount is being steadily increased."



**TAKE TESTIMONY IN SKINNER CASE**

**JURY SECURED AID FIRST WITNESSES PUT ON STAND.**

The entire morning was taken up in the district court yesterday in securing the remainder of the jury in the case of the State of Nevada vs. Fred Skinner.

Deputy Sheriff O'Brien of Rhyolite was the first witness examined and the taking of his testimony occupied nearly the entire afternoon. Dr. Wilkerson followed Mr. O'Brien and he testified as to the wounds on the body of the murdered woman, Isabelle Heskett. He said that she had received three wounds, two of which had entered near the shoulder and the other had entered the back and passed through the left lung and heart. He also dressed two wounds of the defendant, both being on the left side. When asked by the prosecution as to whether these wounds could have been self inflicted the defense objected strongly, but the objection was overruled and the witness answered in the affirmative. The court adjourned at 4:30 until this morning.
