ENTHUSES OVER WEALTH OF MEXICO

A high opinion is had of Mexico as a mineral region when compared with Australia and South Africa by H. Lawrence Read of Kalgoolie, Western Australia, one of the mining operators of that section, now in Chihuahua, who has been making a tour of the republic engaged in studying the mining possibilities. He believes that a mining boom is due in the near future. Mexico, he says, is the best mineralized country on the globe, in his opinion.

"In Australia and South Africa," said he, "we have great mines, but they are not found everywhere, in a continuous line, as here. When we find a good mine it is likely to be hundreds of miles to the next. For 1000 miles here the mines are found, one after another, camp after camp with rich bonanzas stretching over the country. Chihuahua seems to be one vast mineral zone covering the state throughout its length and breadth.

"Abroad we have a very high opinion, indeed, of Mexico," continued Mr. Read. "Both England and France are looking here for investments in mines. I consider myself safe in predicting a boom in the near future. The magnates of South Africa are beginning to get interested in this republic. Australians are also very friendly. In London the Hon. Alfred Deakin, the prime minister of that commonwealth, told me that he had the kindest feelings for Mexico which he once visited some years ago. He has a very high opinion of its industrial possibilities."

Mr. Read is a believer in advertising for a country and urges that Mexico avail herself to the fullest extent of the coming Crystal Palace exposition in London. What is needed is to show Europeans that the country has the mineral resources together with good labor conditions and just laws for capital. He examined the state's exhibit in this city and expresses the opinion that it would be well to send the whole to England.

"As to what can be done by exhibits, let me say that, when Western Australia's whoe population was but 180,000 we gave a mineral and

agricultural exhibit at Kalgoolie, which was visited by 92,000. Then we enlarged it and sent it to Paris and later to Glasgow. Result: Water was piped to the mines at Kalgoolie and for farming over 342 miles of former desert, capital began coming in until today at Fremantle, where once there was but a shallow arm of the sea, there is a harbor accommodating 12,000-ton vessels from all over the world. The immense development has fully justified the confidence of our then premier, Sir John Forrest, in pushing the exhibit."

CHICAGO, Ill., April 6.—Jeremiah J. Crowley, the former Roman Catholic priest, whose criticism of church affairs and his fellow churchmen in the Chicago diocese brought him under the ban of an ecclesiastical interdiction, is now a married man.

The first announcement of the marriage of the former priest was made in the True Voice, the Roman Catholic periodical published weekly in Omaha, Neb. The paper received its information from Rev. J. F. McCarthy, the priest of the parish in Schuyler, Neb., of which Mrs. Crowley was a communicant.

Before the wedding Mrs. Crowley was Miss Blanche MacLeod and she was employed as a stenographer in the office of Crowley, who is engaged in the real estate business in Ellensburg, Wash.

Prior to leaving Chicago he was in the publishing business, his publications being books and pamphlets attacking the Roman Catholic clergy. The wedding ceremony was performed in Seattle March 9.
