JOSEPH S. NORRIS BADLY INJURED

AIR COMPRESSOR EXPLODES AT MIZPAH SHAFT HOUSE YESTERDAY.

The explosion of an air compressor in the Mizpah shaft house yesterday morning came near ending the life of Joseph S. Norris, an employe of the mining company. Mr. Norris is one of Tonopah's foremost citizens, trustee of the Miners' hospital and a prominent member of the Masonic order. The accident occurred just as Mr. Norris was starting the compressor, the cylinder head being blown out and striking him on the right leg. The member was crushed above the ankle and was fractured below the knee. He also suffered a broken rib and several contusions about the head. He was immediately taken to the Miners' hospital, where he was attended to by Dr. Cowden, who stated last evening that the injured limb might possibly be saved. A wire was sent to Reno to Dr. G. H. McKenzie, a surgeon of that place, who is a life long friend of Mr. Norris, and he will arrive at the bedside of the injured man this morning.

MORE HOISTS IN OPERATION

KEY PITTMAN'S LAST IMPRESSION OF RAWHIDE BETTER THAN EVER.

Key Pittman returned yesterday from Rawhide, where he has been inspecting his mining interests there, and was more impressed than ever with the showings of the camp. "This was my fifth trip to Rawhide," said Mr. Pittman, "and a month has intervened since my last trip. On the occasion of my former trips the streets were crowded with people, but business seemed chiefly to be trading in town lots. On my recent visit to the camp there were not so many people to be seen on the streets, but I observed a great many hoists in operation. The report made by some persons who have left the camp to the effect that the boom is dead, is absolutely untrue and emanates either through jealousy, ignorance or disappointment, caused by a lack of energy, or failures emanating from worse causes. There never has been a camp in the State that has disclosed the quantity or grade of ore in the same length of time as has been disclosed in Rawhide. During the past six weeks all of the leading mining companies in the district having developed as far as possible with windlass and other temporary appliances, have been busily engaged in erecting permanent hoisting plants. While this work is in progress the other characters of mining development were necessarily suspended. The recent developments in the Kearns No. 2 lease, the Murray, the Big Four, the Tri-Lode, the Booth, the IXL, and the various leases on the property of the Rawhide Regent and Rawhide Receptor Mining Company, should indicate to any intelligent and thoughtful mining man that Rawhide has today the most wonderful gold showing and is destined to be the equal if not the superior of any camp in the State."

ARTHUR CROCKER RAWHIDE BOOSTER

RETURNS TO NEVADA CAMP, WHERE HE HAS ACQUIRED HOLDINGS.

Arthur J. Crocker, former Tonopah business man, now residing in Oakland, dropped into Tonopah on Sunday from Rawhide. "No use talking," said Mr. Crocker, "once a man lives in the desert you can't keep him away. Here I am with interests at Rawhide that are bound to occupy my attention in Nevada for some time. I am heavily interested in the Gray-Eagle Fraction Mining and Leasing Company, operating on Balloon hill, adjoining the Kearns No. 2. We have opened up the Kearns ledge with a tunnel 300 feet long and have entered the foot wall of a dyke carrying the ore at an incline depth of 120 feet. The values are small at present, but we expect to open up better ore with a development of twenty-five feet more. Rawhide has the best showing on the surface of any camp in the State.
