BLAIR MINER'S END WAS QUICK

GOLDFIELD, April 23.—Portions of the body of Patrick Brennan, who was running a tunnel on the Triangle property alone, about a mile out of Blair, were found yesterday by workmen crossing the property, with indications that they had lain there for some time, which leads to the belief that an explosion heard by children last Thursday was the one in which he came to his death.

The parties who found the portions of the body were horrified yesterday morning while crossing the property to run first across a dismembered leg, then a trunk, and again another leg. The trunk was found some distance from the spot where the explosion had occurred. Two hundred feet up the gulch in which the work was being done, a leg was found, while 150 feet in the other direction from the trunk, the other leg was discovered.

The coroner's jury empaneled last night by Justice Henley, who went to the scene of the gruesome find yesterday, in company with District Attorney Swallow and Deputy William Box, returned a verdict of accidental death; but it is the opinion of District Attorney Swallow that the man deliberately fired the stick of giant powder and waited calmly for it to blow him into eternity.

ENDS LIFE AFTER DEBAUCH.

LOS ANGELES, April 23.—After a prolonged debauch, William J. Balzar, who was at one time apparently in good circumstances, committed suicide in his room in a Merchant-street lodging house by hanging himself to the transom today. The room was strewn with empty liquor bottles. Balzar left a note saying that he had "gone to meet his God."

CHICAGO WEEDING OUT ANARCHISTS

CHICAGO, April 23.—As a direct result of the war of State and Federal governments upon anarchists, 154 men have been deprived of citizenship by the Superior and Circuit courts of Cook county. The naturalization papers of fifty-five men suspected of being at least allied with anarchists were revoked yesterday at the request of United States District Attorney Sims. These supplement the cases of ninety-nine men against whom similar action was taken last week by Judge Hall. There yet remain twenty-five cases to be disposed of, and the disfranchisement of several hundred others seems probable, according to the authorities.

The government authorities have been particularly vigilant of late. All cases went by default, the government being unable to find the men or their witnesses. Many of the men disfranchised are charged with misrepresentation and fraud in procuring their first papers.

COMES WEST ON SECRET ERRAND

WASHINGTON, April 23.—A story is being told in the House of Representatives that somebody high in authority has sent Representative Richard Pearson Hobson on a mission to the Pacific coast, which is expected to bring results that will cause Congress to see the necessity of authorizing the construction of four instead of two battleships. Hobson has left Washington and it is said he will join the fleet at some California port.

What his mission portends is a matter of interesting speculation in the House. Those members who fought the four battleship program fear Hobson has something up his sleeve, and has the aid and support of officials high in authority. Hobson, it is said, left Washington Saturday. It is supposed he will be in San Francisco tomorrow.
