

## HOLD UP HOTEL AT RAWHIDE

INCENDIARIES SET FIRE TO THE SOUTHERN BLOCK AT THE SAME TIME.

(Special to the Bonanza.)  
RAWHIDE, Nev., June 3.—One of the most daring and successful holdups occurred in this camp when the cash register at the bar and the roulette wheel of the Hotel Rawhide was robbed of \$300 at 3 o'clock this morning. The thugs entered the saloon and so quickly was the work done that the thieves were away before an alarm could be spread. About the same time the Southern block, owned by Keefe and Dalton, was fired by incendiaries, supposedly members of the same gang who committed the holdup. It is presumed the motive was robbery. The entire police force are searching for some trace of the robbers, but as yet there is no clew.

## ZOLA'S REMAINS IN THE PANTHEON

PARIS, June 3.—Preparations for the interment tomorrow of the remains of Emil Zola with full national honors in the Pantheon, the French temple of fame, are now complete. The ceremony will be very elaborate and impressive, almost identical with that observed when the body of Victor Hugo, the last great Frenchman to be so honored, was transferred to the Pantheon. Tonight in accordance with an arranged program the remains were borne in a simple hearse followed by the widow, other members family, and a few intimate friends to the Pantheon, where the coffin was placed upon a high catafalque erected in the middle transept beneath a high cupola. Thousands of persons who assembled around the Pantheon raised cheers and groans as the hearse passed. Rowdies attempted to start a disturbance which proved a failure.

## MARYLAND NOT IN BRYAN COLUMN

## PENNY POSTAGE TO GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, June 3.—Penny postage between America and Great Britain becomes effective October 1st. The rate will be the same as between Great Britain and her colonies, one penny (two cents) per ounce. Postmaster General Buxton in announcing the change in the House of Commons today, expressed confidence that the reduction would greatly increase commercial intercourse, and the mutual feeling now existing between the two countries.

## RUSSIAN WOMAN TEACHER HANGED

## ALLISON WILL SUCCEED HIMSELF

DES MOINES, Ia., June 3.—Practically complete returns from the primary election yesterday show that Senator William Allison has been nominated to succeed himself, defeating Governor Cummings by a majority in the neighborhood of 10,000. B. F. Carroll was nominated for governor over Warren Garst by a majority close to 20,000. George Clarke defeated B. Murphy for lieutenant governor by 20,000.

## FEDERAL JURY INDICTS PUBLISHER

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 3.—The Federal Grand Jury today returned three indictments against Jas. Levering, publisher of a mail order monthly, and successful agricultural journal, charging him with using the mails for the purpose of promoting a lottery scheme to defraud. An indictment charging illegal use of the mails was returned against Samuel Phillips, promoter of the St. Paul & Seattle Electric Railway. Martin Quigley, cashier of the Wisconsin Grain Stock Company, was indicted for perjury.

## GERMANS ELECT FIVE SOCIALISTS

BERLIN, June 3.—Diet elections were held throughout Prussia today. The most noteworthy result up to midnight is the election of five Socialist members. This is the first time the Socialists ever elected a member of the diet. So far the returns indicate comparatively few changes in the personnel of the diet, most of the members being re-elected.

## BOOKMAKER IS SENT TO PRISON

OAKLAND, June 3.—Edwin Wilkerson, who started operations as a bookmaker at the Emeryville race-track with a bag of iron washers, and attempted to steal the money wagered by the bettors, was sentenced yesterday by Judge Ogden of Oakland for five years and six months at San Quentin. Wilkerson's scheme to "get rich quick" consisted of opening a book at the race track and decamping with the money while the first race was being run. He took in \$1040, left the betting ring, passed the coin to E. J. Grover, who was sitting in the grand stand, and then started to leave the track, but was arrested.

## NO STATEMENT FROM THE PRESIDENT OF NORTH STAR

### Golden Sidesteps the Mining Company's Status By Attempting to Defend His Action in Refusing to Pay an Advertising Bill.

The ludicrous attempt on the part of Frank, alias Mickey, Golden to explain to a lot of anxious stockholders of the North Star Mining Company the reason for the closing down of that property and the levying of an assessment, by dragging into the case the merits or demerits of an advertising bill which the courts will pass upon, does not answer the question at issue.

We believe, however, that when the case goes to a jury and the facts are presented under oath, that Golden will have to pay this just bill, as he had been presented with it times without number and invariably has offered some excuse for his failure to settle. An attempt has been made to collect this bill through the banks and by collectors, both of which have failed and it was at his own request that suit for collection was brought. We shall have to see Mr. George Blakeslee before believing the statement that Golden was authorized to use his name in connection with the bill. When the jury returns its verdict it will in all likelihood carry with it a statement that Golden is guilty of deliberate lying. On the question of veracity as between the word of W. W. Booth and Mickey Golden, it is the opinion of many people in this community that it will require an oath before a court of competent jurisdiction before Golden can be believed.

The people of Tonopah have just cause for regret in placing confidence in Golden's financial integrity, by being deprived of money entrusted to his care. He has had the use of it for months and months, no settlement being effected yet.

We can well understand the reason

for his failure to produce a statement of the North Star Company's affairs and his evasion of the matter by referring to something entirely foreign to the case under consideration. Golden has his tentacles around certain business houses and the alleged owner of the paper that published Golden's article has his (Golden's) iron collar riveted around his neck and the burden of wearing it is apparent to everyone. Shylocks of the build and character of Golden are not good for any community or State. His place is behind a Baxter street three-ball sign, or with the sign of the ball on his legs. He knows that he is lying when he says that W. W. Booth desired North Star treasury stock from him, for W. W. Booth has learned to mistrust this renegade.

As to the North Star fiasco. The share holders having in mind the past acts of Golden, are right in demanding a statement, not a mass of glittering generalities, as to the amounts expended (for no one knows in what channels the receipts have gone.)

Golden will undoubtedly have an opportunity of having his bluff called—and we understand that at the game of poker this is his long suit—for certain stockholders are scheduled to call upon him in the near future to render an accounting. The people have gotten onto the style of pitching of this three-ball financier, and will commence knocking him out of the box in short order.

Once more, Golden, present a statement to the people who have put up money for North Star, so they may know when the flim-flamming is going to end.

## NINE JURORS TO TRY BARNETT

## DECEIVED WIFE SHOOT HERSELF

RENO, Nev., June 3.—When Mrs. Shad Ledoux, wife of a Democratic politician here, discovered today that her husband had left the city with another woman instead of attending the convention in Carson, she attempted suicide by shooting herself in the neck. Mrs. Ledoux missed her husband Sunday morning, but concluded he had busied himself with politics and failed to notify her of his whereabouts. She discovered this morning that he had not been in the capital, although he was a delegate, and in the presence of B. C. Leadbetter, a university student, she sought death. The wound may be fatal.

On Monday, May 25, he went to Reno to attend the funeral of the late Governor Sparks and on the following Tuesday he attended the funeral of the late Riley Davis of Carson, and returned to his home in this city last Wednesday. He was well known over the State.

## SOLACE IN COMMISSION

MARE ISLAND, Cal., June 3.—The former army transport Solace has been placed in commission in the navy yard, where it has been for some time undergoing a general overhauling. She will serve as parent ship to the torpedo flotilla.

## RESCUES SHIPWRECKED MEN

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 3.—Advices received here state that the Brazilian training ship Benjamin Constant, which was on a voyage to Yokohama, picked up twenty shipwrecked men at Wake Island, a possession of the United States in the Pacific Ocean.

## TYPHOON WRECKS VESSELS

TWO HUNDRED AND SEVENTY LIVES ARE REPORTED LOST.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 3.—Bringing news of an unprecedented disaster to the pearling fleet off West Australia, involving the loss of forty luggers and 270 lives, including twenty whites, by typhoon, the Canadian-Australian liner Manuka arrived today. The disaster to the fleet of pearling luggers occurred at Thursday Island, the typhoon striking the fleet as it was starting for the pearling grounds, scattering the vessels, completely wrecking some and driving others ashore. About twenty Australian pearlmen were lost. The other victims were Malays, Manilamen, Japanese, and Kanakas. Many were rescued by the steamer Parro, sent as a relief steamer from Broome. The bodies of some of the victims were eaten by the sharks. The beach near Broome presented a terrible sight, being covered with wreckage and bodies.

## BUTTE UNION SENDS SOCIALISTS
