USE OF GASOLINE TO BE PROHIBITED

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PASS ORDINANCE RESTRICTING ITS USE.

The county commissioners, at their session yesterday, passed a gasoline ordinance. The law now requires residents of Tonopah to secure permission from the board before gasoline can be used within the city limits. In Rhyolite permission must be given by the chief of police of that town.

The matter of the purchase of the plant of the Tonopah Sewer and Drainage Company, was brought up and referred to the district attorney's office for an opinion on several points of law involved in the proposed purchase, after which adjournment was taken.

CONGRESSMAN'S BRILLIANT RECORD

GEORGE BARTLETT HAS HIGH STANDING AMONG HIS COLLEAGUES.

Henry M. Rives, private secretary to George A. Bartlett, returned to Tonopah yesterday after a six months absence in Washington. In discussing his experiences in Washington, he referred frequently to Mr. Bartlett's remarkable success as a new member of the House. The fact that he secured appointments on three important committees early in the session, being that of Mines and Mining, Irrigation and Arid Lands, and Pacific Railroads, the most important of these committees dealing with Western interests, speaks eloquently of Mr. Bartlett's standing among his colleagues. His efforts and complete success in putting the mining barren bill through the lower branch of Congress, was commended very highly and received most favorable editorial comment in the Washington Times, and other Eastern papers. Mr. Bartlett is probably the only new member who has been so honored for many years and certainly during the present session.

Mr. Bartlett's popularity among his colleagues, both Democrat and Republican, is well known and for that reason, coupled with his earnestness and keen desire to serve the best interests of his State, has rendered it easy for him to secure support for those measures of interest to Nevada. This was evidenced by the manner in which he secured the appropriation for the Carson Indian School, after the item had been stricken from the bill.

Mr. Bartlett will return in about 2 week after a short visit with relatives in Kentucky.

DELEGATES RETURN FROM CONVENTION

DELEGATION TO NATIONAL CONVENTION INSTRUCTED FOR BRYAN.

Quite a number of local delegates to the Democratic State convention, which was held at Carson, returned on yesterday morning's train from the capital city. The Nye county delegates were successful in landing one of their number as chairman of the convention, the Hon. Frank F. Mannix, editor of the Bullfrog Miner, he being nominated by the Hon. Key Pittman of Tonopah.

The convention passed resolutions enlisting the work of Congressman George Bartlett, and recommended the selection of Theodore C. Bell of California as temporary chairman at the National Democratic convention, to be held in Denver. The Nye county delegation were the only ones who wore badges in the convention.

The delegates elected were United States Senator Francis G. Newlands, Governor D. S. Dickerson, John Sunderland, at large; W. S. Elliott of Esmeralda, Charles R. Evans of Nye, Edward C. Clark of Lincoln, Alternates, A. G. Dawley for Newlands, Charles Green for Dickerson, Fred L. White for Sunderland, Thomas R. Dunn for Elliott, A. P. Bettersworth for Clark, and Capt. G. W. Thatcher for Evans. The delegates were instructed for Bryan.

George Bartlett was placed in nomination as one of the delegates, but Thatcher of Nye, asked that the name be withdrawn, for Bartlett already feels that his party has honored him sufficiently to allow new honors to pass to other workers in the ranks of the party.

HEINZE TO RETURN TO MONTANA
