**CONSUMMATE A BIG MINING DEAL**

QUARTER OF A MILLION PAID FOR MINE NEAR HAWTHORNE.

One of the biggest mining deals in the history of Southern Nevada that has taken place for some time was the transaction in Goldfield, Wednesday, when \$40,000 in good, cold, hard cash was paid by J. D. Hubbard, representing himself and Chicago capitalists, binding a bargain for the Adams and Miller group of ten claims eight miles from Hawthorne, on the Bodie road, and a lease on the Silver King property. The purchase price, which is only for a control was \$250,000. Messrs. Adams and Miller are the well-known merchants of Mina and Hawthorne, and Mr. Hubbard was formerly president of the Combination Mining Company at Goldfield. The company taking over the property, which is headed by Mr. Hubbard, is known as the Chicago Development Company. The payments range over a period of 18 months. The mine is a phenomenal one. The greatest depth reached is in a shaft 200 feet, with crosscuts and drifts aggregating 400 feet. A large body of silver lead ore has been opened up which goes \$360 per ton. Less than two months ago a well-known engineer made an examination of this property, and in his report stated that the indications were good for the opening up of a body of ore, and since that time this large body has been uncovered.

**FOURTH OF JULY COMMITTEES MEET**

SELECT ORATOR OF DAY—THE ORDER OF THE PARADE AND LINE OF MARCH.

At a meeting of all the committees of the Fourth of July celebration, held at the Elks' club rooms last evening, various matters pertaining to the conduct of the carnival were acted upon. J. J. Owens, chairman, called the meeting to order. The finance committee reported having met with a very generous response from business men and citizens, and the amount received insured the carrying out of the ideas of members of the committees in a very lavish manner. A committee was appointed to wait upon the merchants and see what could be done relative to giving the men in their employ a holiday on the Fourth. P. E. Keeler was selected as the orator of the day and Miss Florence McNeil will read the Declaration of Independence. J. J. Owens was appointed marshal of the day, and his aides are James Cleary, of the Miners' Union; Dr. C. L. Hammond, of the Order of Eagles, and Robert L. Prouty, of the Elks. The following was adopted as the order of parade and line of march: Marshals and aides. Platoon of mounted police. Tonopah Brass Band. Grand Army of the Republic. Goddess of Liberty. School children. Odd Fellows. Knights of Pythias. Miners' Union. Eagles. Seryian Society. Floats. Firemen.

The line of march is from Main street to Cross avenue, to Florence, thence to lower Main, countermarch to Brounger avenue, Brounger avenue to rear of post office, countermarch to Main, where the drilling contest is to be held. The oration and reading of the Declaration of Independence will occur at this point. The sports of the Fourth will be a three-legged race, sack race, ladies' nail-driving contest, egg race, 100-yard dash, bicycle race, pony race, baseball at 3 o'clock.

On the 5th, drilling contest at 9:50 a. m.; horse race, 12:30, followed by the married woman's race, young ladies' race, tug of war, water fight, fat men's race, hose race—all of which takes place on Main street; ball game at 3:30.

**FORMATION OF A BASEBALL LEAGUE**

ENTHUSIASTS MEET AND DISCUSS WAYS AND MEANS FOR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION.

A meeting of baseball enthusiasts, including the managers of the following baseball teams: Elks-Eagles, Tonopah Mining Company, Montana-Tonopah Mining Company, Tonopah-Belmont Mining Company and Millers, was held yesterday afternoon for the purpose of arranging for the securing of permanent baseball grounds and the incorporation of an athletic association to have control of the same, and also with a view of discussing the formation of a baseball league of the various teams and for the carrying on of any other sports they may wish.

A committee was appointed to wait upon W. B. Sollender, the owner of the present baseball grounds, and arrangements were effected with him whereby he will donate the grounds to the association, provided the people of Tonopah give the association the necessary support to carry on baseball satisfactorily.

A committee has been appointed to wait upon the business men and others interested in baseball to secure their assistance and financial support. A corporation with a capital of \$10,000 will be formed, and the committee will take subscriptions for this stock, par value \$1 per share. The committee consists of Messrs. W. W. Charles, W. B. Alexander, Ed Malley, Lem Platt, Joe Gori, Paddy Grimes and W. S. Johnson, and will solicit subscriptions for this stock, and they will be glad to receive subscriptions in any amount from \$1 up.

The plans of the committee having the matter in charge look to the completion of arrangements and the fencing and improving of the grounds so that the schedule may be started immediately after the 5th of July.

The County Commissioners will be asked to improve the streets leading to the baseball grounds in order that the discomfort which has formerly attended traveling to and from the ball grounds may be obviated.

The Tonopah Water Company has already made the connections necessary to sprinkle the grounds, and every effort will be made from now on to make the attending of future baseball games as pleasant as possible.

This enterprise is one in the interest of the public and deserves to meet with hearty approval and interest of the people at large.
