BIG STRIKE ON TOMAHAWK—MACHINERY HAS BEEN ORDERED.

The Tomahawk Mining Company of Bellehelen has cut a five-foot ledge of \$200 ore in the face of the 400-foot drift they are now operating. Machinery has been ordered and the company will spare no expense to make this mine a dividend producer. The original name of the company was the "Never Sweat."
