MAN'S FACE IS BEATEN TO PULP

JAMES STACK, AN ELECTRICIAN, WAYLAIED AT AN EARLY HOUR MONDAY MORNING.

James Stack, an electrician, while proceeding homeward at an early hour Monday morning was set upon by two Italians at the corner of Oddie avenue and Summit street and given a dreadful beating. His face was reduced to almost a pulp, the eyeball hanging below its socket. Stack put up a stiff fight and forced his assailants to flee. A passerby found the injured man almost exhausted and rendered assistance. He was taken to the Casino and an officer summoned. He was then taken to Dr. Cunningham's office, where his injuries were dressed at the conclusion of which he was able to walk to his cabin. Stack promised to appear at police headquarters yesterday afternoon but failed to do so. He also failed to leave his address and the police authorities are at a loss to find him, although search was made last night for his residence.

CHINESE ATTACK TONOPAH CITIZEN

BILLY FORD, AN AMERICANIZED CHINAMAN, IS POUNCED UPON.

There was trouble in Tonopah's Chinatown Sunday night and the kiyis and other celestial yells that filled the air aroused the entire neighborhood. A number of chinks, each claiming to be a cousin to the other, had a falling out with Billy Ford, an Americanized Chinaman, who is well and favorably known in the southern district, and last night some one fired a shot at one of the cousins. He immediately accused Billy and then there was more chin music for a fair. The cousins threatened vengeance and a tong war seemed imminent when Billy was placed under arrest. He immediately raised bonds and when released a number of threats were made against him by several of the cousins, who were in turn arrested and placed under bonds to keep the peace, and then the trouble was ended for the time being.
