**RAWHIDE VERITABLE TREASURE HOUSE**

H. H. SUTHERLAND, MANAGER OF THE GRUTT HILL COALITION, IN TONOPAH.

General Manager and President H. H. Sutherland of the famous Grutt Hill Coalition lease at Rawhide, arrived in this city yesterday and will leave this morning for the great Nevada camp. Mr. Sutherland is a miner of experience, he having operated in Cobalt and many other of the great camps of the world.

"In my opinion Rawhide will be the most phenomenal camp the world has ever known," said Mr. Sutherland last evening. "Think of the knocking, the damaging stories sent out in an attempt to discredit the camp and a payge on in the country when it was impossible to obtain money in any quarter of the United States, yet today you will find a camp that is shipping ore, has twenty-seven hoists in operation and twenty-one more ordered and en route from different mining machinery concerns. Her weekly shipments of ore reach 250 tons, with a value of \$40,000. The Kearns shaft has reached a depth of 400 feet and they are rushing work to a depth of 700 feet. On the Jordan lease of the Queen Mascot Mining company ten tons went forward to Hazen which gave returns of \$550 a ton. There were besides 1500 pounds of high grade which went approximately \$1.70 a pound. On this lease they are down forty-four feet and have a vein over four feet wide. They have installed a 25-horse power gasoline engine and will sink to a depth of 150 feet and then start the work of developing the rich vein. The ore is permanent and of a grade far in excess of anything there or in any other camp. This company at the present time has the largest pay roll of any single property in the district and miners are being added as fast as they can use them.

"The Grutt Hill Coalition, of which I am the manager, is a close corporation. Charles Gates, son of John W. Gates, offered \$60,000 in gold cash for the lease which we are now operating, and was turned down. Myself and associates were fortunate enough to secure it and we shall never regret the purchase. At a depth of thirty-five feet we took out enough rich ore to make a nice shipment. When the high grade passed out of the shaft we sank to 106 feet, where we encountered the Grutt Hill Mint vein. A 110-pound sack of ore netted us \$3495 or \$31.70 per pound. The company has been quietly developing and getting near to the bullion streak each day for the past week. For four feet before coming into this almost pure seam of gold, the ore has been rich beyond all expectations. Further developments opened the vein to a width of three feet before the rich seam was encountered. As I said before, I have been in the mining business all my life, but the sight of this glittering mass is beyond description. The seam is two inches wide and shows the metal from the back to the bottom. Specific gravity tests show that the seam is 83 per cent metal—gold—that packs a trace of silver only. The ore is being taken out and shipped direct to the mint at San Francisco. The hoist for our property arrived there yesterday and installation will be begun at once.

"The McKinley lease, which is on the Rawhide Rector Mines company, has just made a shipment of twenty tons, which will average \$210 to the ton. This is in the Regent district, which is rapidly forging to the front. "I firmly believe that had Rawhide not made good it would have been an almost vital blow to Nevada. As it is today she is undoubtedly the brightest star in all the galaxy in this great state."

Mr. Sutherland is a cousin of Hugh Sutherland, the well known mining man of this district, and was his guest while in the city.

**NO CHANCE SAVE IN A LANDSLIDE**

WRITER IN CHICAGO TRIBUNE FIGURES THAT BRYAN IS DOOMED TO DEFEAT.

Now that both parties have nominated their candidates and agreed upon their platform, it is natural to ask, writes Raymond in the Chicago Tribune, what will the harvest be and who will reap the fruits of victory? It is too early to answer these questions now, but it is possible to give a general forecast of the probable results, and this is what I propose to do in as dispassionate a way as is possible under the circumstances.

"As the situation seems to me at the close of the two conventions, with all the actual fight yet to come, it is difficult to figure out how Mr. Bryan can be elected. It is necessary first of all to cast up the electoral votes of the states and to try to get at some idea of those which are certain, or reasonably so, for either party, those which are doubtful, and of the latter those which are probable.

**SOLID GOLD LEASE GETS MACHINERY**

**ROUND MOUNTAIN PROPERTY NOW HAS UP-TO-DATE MILL.**

"Slim" Morgan, one of the prominent mining and business men of Round Mountain, is in from the great hydraulic camp and reports the same continuation of prosperity in that camp as has been since its birth.

"The machinery for the Solid Gold lease mill arrived there today," said Mr. Morgan, "and a large force of men will be put to work immediately in installing it. The mill will undoubtedly be running inside of twenty days. It will have a capacity of fifty tons daily. The work on the lease has been progressing steadily and there is a large amount of ore on the dump awaiting to be milled. This ore will average around \$40 a ton and there are ledges that will go much higher.

"The Mauli and Mattley lease on the Great Western has a force of men at work and they are taking out over \$500 worth of rock daily."

Mr. Morgan will return in several days to Round Mountain, but before doing so will make a visit to Goldfield.
