THINKS HE HIT FLEEING BURGLAR

B. L. HOXIE FIRES FIVE SHOTS AT MIDNIGHT PROWLERS SATURDAY NIGHT.

What is thought to have been a bold attempt at burglary took place at the residence of Superintendent Chandler of the McNamara Mining company somewhere between 1 and 2 o'clock Saturday morning.

The story as related to the police authorities, who had been summoned by telephone to the scene of the reported attempt is that at 10:30 in the evening Mr. Chandler had been awakened by some unusual noise. Thinking perhaps it was the restlessness of the child in the next room he made an investigation and again retired. B. L. Hoxie, who rooms at the residence, came in at an early hour of the morning, and Mr. Chandler awakened again. Going into the hall way to speak to Mr. Hoxie he was startled by Mrs. Chandler calling to them that some one was prying open a screen. Mr. Hoxie went to his room, armed himself and he and Mr. Chandler started out the door. As they rounded the house they saw two men who immediately started to flee. One of the supposed burglars fled across the dump and was seen running by the top men working at the mine. The other fled directly across the dump followed by Hoxie, who was shooting as the man ran, emptying five chambers of his gun. Hoxie claims that the man on reaching the edge of the dump must have been hit for he fell fifteen feet through the ore bin. From there he jumped fifteen feet into the cut of the railway and made his escape.

Mr. Chandler immediately telephoned to the police and the officers were on the ground shortly thereafter, but a search of several hours failed to reveal any trace of the wounded man.

As the lights at the McNamara render the dump almost as bright as day, Hoxie was enabled to give a very good description of the men and the police were busy all yesterday and last night in looking up suspects. No one had called for the services of a physician, so if the man was seriously wounded he will undoubtedly be compelled to seek medical aid and can then be located.

WEST END MINING COMPANY'S REPORT

OLD BOARD OF DIRECTORS RE-ELECTED—MINE HAS FINE SHOWING.

The report of the West End Consolidated Mining company, which has just been received, shows that the old board of directors was unanimously elected. They are F. M. Smith, Dennis Searles, J. J. McQuillan, J. G. Butler, Jr., B. F. Edwards, W. J. Douglass and C. B. Zabriskie. The report of Superintendent Fred Corkill shows the condition of the company's property and the work done during the past year. One of the most important matters in the report of the superintendent shows that in the sinking of the company's new working shaft they have encountered an immense vein of quartz fully fifty feet wide, fifteen feet of which is very high grade. Samples of this high grade runs from \$500 to \$1000 and the whole fifteen feet will readily go \$100 without sorting. This is reported as high a grade of ore as ever found in Tonopah. The distance between these new workings and the old workings in the east is close to 400 feet, thus giving great possibilities for future development.

In his recapitulation Superintendent Corkill says that they have run 952 feet in drifts, 529 feet in crosscuts, 432 feet of raises and 339 feet of shafts and winzes, adding a total of 2552 feet to their underground developments. Assessment work has been done on all of the unpatented claims. He also looks for good developments in the Ohio ground and finishes his report with a statement that the West End Consolidated is a property that compares very favorably with any in the Tonopah mining district with ore showings, and is most favorably located in the mineral belt.

An addenda says that on July 27 litigation between the West End and McNamara had been settled satisfactorily out of court.

The secretary's report shows that the shipments of ore from the first to the present aggregate 1580 tons, having a gross value of \$103,862, while the freight and treatment charges were \$36,595, making a net value of \$67,267.

WANT A PARDON FOR FRANK EVERETT

FRIENDS OF MAN WHO KILLED RAILWAY MAN CLAIM INSANITY.

CARSON, Aug. 1.—The case of Frank Everett, serving a life term in the state prison for the murder of Foreman Malone at the shops of the Southern Pacific at Mina, held the attention of the board of pardons all day yesterday and will likely be decided Monday morning by the board. Friends of Everett claim they want to get him out of prison so that he can receive treatment for insanity as he has become insane since his incarceration; they desire either a parole or absolute pardon for the convict.

The fight for the freedom of Everett began shortly after he was convicted of the brutal murder of Foreman Malone and it is claimed that large sums of money have been expended in his behalf but so far the fight has been fruitless. The first move after his incarceration was the bringing of insanity proceedings in Ormsby county, friends of the man desiring to have him removed from the state prison to the state hospital for the insane, where he would receive treatment. A hearing was held in this city and expert witnesses testified at the time, their fees being paid by friends of the prisoner. After a long hearing Judge Murphy, then district judge, handed down a decision to the effect that Everett was sane and that he was only suffering from epilepsy and accordingly must be kept in the state prison.
