

HAS DOVER RESIGNED?

Rumored That Secretary of Republican National Committee Is at Loggerheads With Hitchcock.

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—The Daily News today says that Elmer F. Dover has resigned as secretary of the Republican national committee. This is denied in other quarters and the statement is made that Dover and Chairman Hitchcock have patched up whatever differences existed.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Frank W. Hitchcock made a visit to President Roosevelt at Oyster Bay today. Upon his return he said he had nothing to say regarding the reported resignation of Dover. Mr. Dover arrived in the city today and denied the report, but declined to say what he might do in the future. It is expected that Secretary Dover will call on Chairman Hitchcock tomorrow.

BUTTE MAN KILLS BROTHER-IN-LAW

BUTTE, Aug. 7.—James W. Ryan, brother of John A. Ryan, superintendent of the North Butte Extension company, today shot and killed his brother-in-law, Daniel F. Mooney. Ryan surrendered and was placed in jail. Mrs. Mooney, Ryan's sister, died last week and Mooney had just returned from Dover, New Jersey, where interment took place. The shooting is believed to have been the result of family differences. Both families are prominent in business and social life.

HEAD OFFICER UNIFORM RANK

LURED TO HIS DEATH

YOUNG BOY MURDERED AND BODY HACKED TO PIECES.

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—Sensational information connecting Hassin Nemmer with the murder of Tuffa Shashem, the boy whose body, hacked to pieces, was found in Mud lake, was obtained by the police today. Two young companions of the murdered youth confessed that on Sunday last young Shashem was lured into a house by Nemmer and that they waited half an hour for him and then left the scene. That was the last seen of the murdered boy.

TEN MILLIONS FOR STEEL CARS

PITTSBURG, Aug. 7.—A contract, said to be the largest ever let for steel cars, is now being closed with the Pressed Steel Car company of Pittsburgh by Gould-Harriman interests. It is for about 10,000 steel cars to supply every one of the Gould lines and the price will be about \$10,000,000.

The contract will cover three and perhaps five years delivery, and will give employment to about 1000 men for that length of time. It is understood that E. H. Harriman, before he agreed to finance the Gould roads, made a complete inventory of the rolling stock and gave it as his opinion that not less than \$10,000,000 would properly equip the lines.

SUPPOSED AUTO ROBBERS TAKEN

CARSON, Aug. 7.—Members of the state police apprehended three strangers in this city last evening and booked them as suspects in the Wheeler auto holdup. They gave their names as A. J. Scott, George Miller, and Dow. Dow was in communication with a woman in Gardnerville by telephone last night, stating that she was his wife. The suspects arrived in a single buggy like the one driven by the robbers. All are large men, and answer the description of those implicated in the Reno affair.

Among other things found on the trio was a "goose-neck" used to play a roulette wheel. The men bucked roulette here before their arrest last night, but the dealers had been warned and the could not use the crooked device.

M'FARLAND WINS IN THE SEVENTH

There was no knockout, but Referee Eyton stopped the fight in the seventh because Brock was in distress and all but out. He fought gamely to the last and carried the fight to McFarland from the beginning, but was out fought at all stages. He was knocked down in the second with a clean swing and saved by the bell at the end of the fifth. McFarland wore him down. He was too fast and strong for Brock.

REPORT DESERT TRAGEDY

MAN AND TEAM DROP DEAD AFTER DRINKING WATER AT WELL.

IMPERIAL, Cal., Aug. 7.—The coroner was today apprised of a desert tragedy which occurred Thursday morning at Coyote wells. An unknown man, with his wife and two children, driving across the desert to San Diego county, stopped on the desert and went with a team of horses to get water at the wells. After drinking their fill they started back and both horses and man fell dead on the desert, and the bodies were found later by a young son who went in search. The name of the man and the cause of his death is not yet known.

No large number of men came in from the east or south. Pickets are guarding the entrances to the shops. There were rumors of a large number of strike-breakers coming late tonight. No propositions for settlement were made today. The company has been sending bedding to the shops today.

TORONTO, Aug. 7.—There is no lack of applications in the West Toronto shops by men anxious to take the places of strikers. All capable men are being put on.

LONG DEFEATED BY AN EDITOR

TOPEKA, Aug. 7.—While the results of the primaries held Tuesday in Kansas can not be stated positively, the returns up to this morning tended to confirm the reports of late last night, showing the probable nomination of Walter R. Stubbs, the Lawrence county railway contractor, for governor on the Republican ticket over Cyrus Leland, Jr., and the naming of Joseph L. Bristow, editor of the Salina Journal and formerly fourth assistant postmaster general, for United States senator to succeed Chester I Long of Medicine Lodge, whose term expires in March, 1909.

The returns are extremely slow in coming in. Majorities can not be even guessed at, but every return received so far at the different headquarters in Topeka indicates that it has been something of a landslide for Bristow; and that Stubbs is the nominee by a safe majority. Results of the Democratic vote are almost an unknown quantity, as they are incomplete.

Early returns indicate the nomination of all the present congressmen on the Republican ticket.

DROPS DEAD ON STREET.
CARSON, Aug. 7.—Millard L. Catlin, one of the best known residents of Carson City, was discovered dying a few minutes before 11 o'clock last night at the corner of Nevada and Third streets and he breathed his last a few seconds after Officer Brule and Moss arrived on the scene. Heart disease caused death.

BRYAN HAS CHANGED HIS PLANS AGAIN

FAIRVIEW, Neb., Aug. 7.—Finances for the campaign were under discussion today. A sum of not less than \$500,000 is considered necessary and it is conceded that contributions from individuals will not likely reach this sum. Former Senator Pettigrew of South Dakota arrived direct from a conference in New York with Chairman Mack and consulted with Mr. Bryan. Senator Pettigrew says the Democrats are nearer together than ever before. Bryan again changed the plan for a start of his campaign as the result of Senator Pettigrew's visit.

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—John W. Kern, Democratic candidate for vice president, was an unexpected visitor at national headquarters in the Auditorium Annex which were formerly opened today. The Democratic congressional committee also opened headquarters at the Annex today. John W. Tomlinson has been appointed head of the national bureau of Democratic clubs.
