Burn is an assumed name and it is understood that he came here from the northern part of the state where he has a wife.

**MINERAL OUTPUT IS VERY HEAVY**

INCREASE IN TONNAGE SINCE SECOND WEEK OF JULY IS 848 TONS.

The mineral output of southern Nevada has reached such proportions that a scarcity of cars to transport the ores to the mills has been experienced for some weeks past. Though the Tonopah and Goldfield railway officials made a draft upon the Southern Pacific at Sparks on two or three occasions they were unable to get enough rolling stock, but are now enabled to handle it, having secured quite a number of cars. The tonnage from this camp and Goldfield is assuming enormous proportions. A comparative statement herewith furnished shows that the increase since the second week in July has been 843 tons:

**MONEY FOR STATE SCHOOLS AND ROADS**

On account of a provision in the agricultural bill, which was passed by congress during the last session, 25 per cent of all money received from each forest reserve during the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1908, will be paid at the end thereof by the secretary of the treasury to the state or territory in which said reserve is situated, to be expended under the direction of the legislature for the use of the public schools and public roads in the county in which the reserve is located.

From the reports from the records of the forest service the net receipts from national forests in Nevada were as follows:

Twenty-five per cent of this amount, or \$4,577.95, is the approximate amount that will be received by Nevada for the use of the schools and roads.
