DELEGATES ON WAY TO CONVENTION

REPUBLICANS GATHER AT GOLDFIELD TOMORROW TO SELECT STATE TICKET.

The delegates to the Republican state convention to be held at Goldfield tomorrow are all ready heading towards the southern camp. Quite a few delegates from the north will pass through this city this morning and an endeavor will be made to have them stop over between trains. A few of the Tonopah delegates will accompany them in the afternoon, while the remainder will follow on the early train Saturday morning. The fight for congress seems to be confined to Maxson of Reno and Douglas and Rogers of Goldfield. Hon. Hugh Brown will in all probability receive the nomination for justice of the supreme court by acclamation. Senator Harry Morehouse of Esmeralda is slated as chairman for the convention. A caucus will be held by the Nye county delegates to consider the naming of a candidate for district judge just before the convention is called to order. The banquet at the Goldfield hotel in honor of the delegates will be given Saturday evening.

SENATOR ODDIE BACK IN TONOPAH

SUCCEEDS IN INTERESTING EASTERNERS IN PROJECT THAT WILL HELP NEVADA.

Senator T. L. Oddie, who has been absent for nearly five months in the east, his time being principally divided between New York and Philadelphia, is back in the camp and state to whose upbuilding he has been one of the most important factors.

While east he took occasion to attend the Republican national convention and was active in support of Taft for whom he has a very high regard. The feeling among the people with whom he came in contact is that the election of Taft and Sherman is a foregone conclusion.

Climatic conditions he reports as something fearful. The heat being overpowering by day and night and he expressed great relief in coming back to the desert where the weather is the most delightful to be found anywhere.

The senator's direct mission to the money markets of this continent was for the purpose of pushing forward a mining venture the magnitude of which was such that a great amount of capital was necessary. Arriving in New York just at the time when the financial depression was at its height, it would have daunted any man save such as T. L. Oddie. He was successful, however, and will in a month's time have a party of eastern capitalists in this state and together they will make an inspection of the various districts, looking into the possibilities of the various camps and on their return will complete an organization that will mean much to the state.

Said the senator: "I have laid plans for a campaign of big developments in mining and have succeeded in enlisting capital to come to Nevada. Our state has received a black eye in quite a few instances in wildcatting and other illegitimate measures. With those whom I came in contact I endeavored as far as possible to remove the stigma. The panic has had a good effect in this direction. It has eliminated this class entirely. There is a great interest manifested in the east on conditions in this state and there will be a greater one by this fall. People will now go into the legitimate and the number of dividend payers that are now coming to the front will induce investors to turn their eyes towards Nevada. By the first of the coming year Nevada will be the center of attraction for all parts of the country. Personally I believe that this state is in its infancy relative to mineral production and the outlook for its taking first place in the galaxy of precious metal producing states is flattering."

"As to the political situation in this state, senator?" was the next question asked.

"With the character of men spoken of as candidates by the Republicans, and the internal dissensions in the Democratic ranks, I have no hesitancy in saying that the entire Republican ticket should win. I intend going to the state convention at Goldfield Saturday to be an onlooker at the proceedings."

On the subject of his possible entry into the senatorial race Mr. Oddie said: "The campaign of work that I have planned stops all possibility of my becoming a candidate for that high office. I was detained in the east a great deal longer than I expected owing to delays and was enjoined from returning at the time I had calculated upon. I had announced that I would allow my friends to wage a campaign in my interests for the position of United States senator, but conditions have so changed that I could not under any consideration give the time to make a

MEMBERS OF TONOPAH LODGE WILL ATTEND INSTALLATION IN A BODY.

The Tonopah Aerie of Eagles No. 271 will go to Millers Sunday for the purpose of installing an aerie of that order in the mill town. It promises to be a red letter day in the history of the order. Con Ahern of Virginia City, district deputy grand worthy president, will be the installing officer. A special train will leave this city at 1:30 o'clock Sunday, containing at least 150 members of the order. The fare for the round trip will be 80 cents.
