**Republican Primary Call**

The following call has been issued for the Republican primaries and county convention:

At a regular meeting of the Republican central committee of Nye county, state of Nevada, August 29, 1908, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Republican county convention of Nye county be held in Tonopah on the 21st day of September, 1908, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates to represent the Republican party at the general election to be held on the third day of November, 1908, for the following offices to-wit: Two state senators, seven assemblymen, sheriff, district attorney, county clerk, county treasurer, auditor and recorder, county surveyor, public administrator, one county commissioner (long-term), one county commissioner (short-term), justice of the peace and constable for the various townships; and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention; and be it further

**RICKEY'S DEED DECLARED VOID**

**LOS ANGELES EXCITED OVER OWENS RIVER WATER RIGHTS.**

BISHOP, Cal., Sept. 3.—So thoroughly aroused has the city of Los Angeles become over the disputed water rights near Independence claimed alike by the city and some Plutes that today City Attorney L. R. Hewitt took a hand in the matter in the interests of the city.

Hewitt, as are all Los Angeles officials and visitors when here, is the guest of Fred Eaton at his ranch near Big Pine and yesterday spent all day at Independence and vicinity to compromise the water rights in dispute. Today he was taken to Long valley by Mr. Eaton to look over the great reservoir site.

The most obstreperous Indian family is the John Olds family, whose bill of sale for land which they owned was taken by T. B. Rickey some years ago, transferred on an option to Eaton and by him turned over to the city of Los Angeles.

None of these parties took cognizance of federal laws which prevent Indians from disposing of land before they have held the legal title to it for twenty years. Olds has been on the land for more than thirty years, but his title from the government, however, is not nearly as old and not old enough in fact to make a transfer valid.

When the facts of the transfer became public, Indian Commissioner Ashbury at Carson investigated the case and informed Los Angeles that the sale of the Olds property to the city was illegal and could not stand. Olds was by this time indisposed to leave the land anyway and when ordered to vacate by the city refused. His stubbornness has been the cause of all the trouble.

Hewitt had nothing to say regarding the possible outcome of the dispute, but the laws of the government covering the case seem to be very arbitrary on this point and the interest here has naturally centered on this since it appears to be the first instance in this valley where the city, hitherto almighty in its demands may have to back down. On the other

hand the water right in question lies in the very center of Los Angeles property and is of such a valuable character that the city has been depending upon it very much.
