

REFUSES TO MOVE REGISTRY OFFICE

JUDGE BRISSELL GAVE REASONS
TO COMMISSIONERS WHY HE
WOULD NOT OBEY.

The county commissioners yesterday sent an order to Judge Brissell that he move his registration office down from the present site to some place on the main thoroughfare or if he failed to do this to hand in his resignation. When the order was handed the judge he nearly suffered a stroke of apoplexy and his reply to the honorable board was more forcible than eloquent. He stated the reasons for keeping the office in the justice court were that at that place he could give his undivided attention to the registration and could register people at all hours, something he could not do if the office was moved; and that the move would require the hiring of a deputy and this was something he wished to avoid as he could keep the register in better shape by handling it individually.

And in the meantime the office will continue to be in the justice court, where the judge can be found at all hours of the day and night, ready to accommodate those who can not call during the daylight hours.

CARLSON MILL DOES FINE WORK

INITIAL RUN AT GOLDEN ARROW
SHOWS GREAT SAVING IN
VALUES.

G. F. Plyer of San Jose, California, president of the Carlson Mining and Milling company of Golden Arrow, came in from that district yesterday and reports a great deal of activity there. The Carlson mill has been completed and has just finished its initial run, which was a marked success. The run was made on horn-silver ore and the prediction made that the mill would be unable to save any of the values was disproved when an assay of the tailings taken showed that values to the extent of 74 cents to the ton had been lost. This is considered remarkable as the ore only went from \$10 to \$12 a ton. The mill is a ten-stamp one with concentrators and while only one shift is working at present the success of the first run will undoubtedly cause an extra shift to soon be added.

Mr. Plyer leaves this morning for a short business trip to San Francisco, from whence he will return in about ten days.
