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TEX RICKARD IN A NEW ROLE

Tex Rickard, who won extended fame as promoter of the Gans-Nelson Goldfield fight and who tried to pull off another meeting of the two men at Ely this fall, has added more laurels to his crown by acting as referee in an amateur and totally impromptu one-round go between two of his fellow directors in the Rawhide Western railroad.

Rickard, who has just come from Rawhide, is very modest about his exploit, and Thursday night at the St. Francis was reluctant to talk about it, but from what he did say, it is evident that there was no stalling on either side and that the fight would have far exceeded the famous forty-three round contest, if Rickard himself had not stopped it.

Hicks and Reed were the combatants. The latter is well known here as Charles Wesley Reed, the attorney, formerly of this city. He has the contract for the grading of the new road, which is to furnish Rawhide an outlet for its ores. Hicks is also a director in the company.

The fight occurred in a room in Rawhide. Rickard was the only eye witness. According to his story, one of them led off with a shorter and uglier word, the other countered with a right to the jaw and then there were three minutes of rough house. Both men are heavy and their blows told. When Rickard finally succeeded in calling time he was covered with blood himself and the other two were not handsome. Rickard said it was a draw, but thought Reed showed the more science.

Rickard says he doesn't know what caused the row, but through the intervention of friends the two men are once more on speaking terms. Whether either will seek a return match remains to be seen.—San Francisco Chronicle.
