

FLORENCE LITIGATION IS SETTLED

GOLDFIELD, Oct. 15.—All litigation between the Florence Goldfield Mining company and the Little Florence Mining company, has been settled out of court to the satisfaction of all parties concerned.

This adjustment involves not only the \$117,000 in dispute between the corporations on the claim that it belonged to the leasing company, but also the \$2,500,000 damage suit brought by the Little Florence against the parent concern as an outgrowth of interruptions in the lease.

The attorneys in the case and those directly involved were free to confess last evening that the settlement was made as a result of concessions from both sides. All concerned realized the blow given to the Goldfield district by such a momentous litigation involving many hundreds of thousands of dollars and characterized ample funds on both sides to wage a warfare that might have continued for years.

A spirit of patriotism was displayed by the opposing elements, inasmuch as they realized the injury done the district by prolonged litigation. By each giving

away a little the compromise was gradually reached and now both parties to the controversy are free to do as they will without fear of molestation. The Florence has the richest estate in the district. The Little Florence lease mined perhaps the richest ore ever taken out of the camp. A tie-up between them not only worked an injury to the industry here, but greatly depreciated the value of the two securities.

The terms of the settlement are not made public, but will be embraced in the letters to be issued by the two companies to their stockholders. An order was issued by Judge Langan of the district court yesterday, by which the \$117,935.96 shall be paid to the Florence Goldfield Mining company, or the parent concern. This is the money claimed by the leasing company as its net profit on the Red King claim.

The stock market last night reflected the settlement between the two big concerns. Florence proper sold freely, the closing sale being at \$4.05 or a decided advance over last week.

WRIGHT WILL NOW TRY HIS MACHINE FOR HEIGHT

PARIS, Oct. 15.—According to a Paris newspaper Wilbur Wright, the aviator, has told Lazare Weiler, head of the syndicate that has purchased the French rights to the Wright brothers' machine, that as soon as he has completed his contract with the syndicate by instructing three pilots in the workings of the aeroplane he will attempt some flights for height. There is no reason, he is reported to have said, why he should not go up to a height of 3000 feet. He also spoke of trying some flights without the motor and without the derrick which is now required to start the aeroplane.

ROBBED HER JAIL ASSOCIATES.

RENO (Nev.), Oct. 15.—Irene Duff, the notorious pickpocket, who claims to be related to Judge Hawley of Colorado, finished her sentence in the county jail here today, but had only about an hour of freedom. Soon after she left the jail many of the prisoners began to make complaints that things belonging to them were missing. As a last resort Irene was hunted up and brought back to jail and beneath her clothing was found at least ten different articles she had taken from the other prisoners, within two hours before her release.

RUSSIAN CRUISER DAMAGED.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 15.—The Russian protected cruiser Oleg, which ran aground about twenty miles from Libau yesterday, is fast on a reef. The cruiser was badly damaged.
