

## Brown and Flanigan Make Hit a Goldfield

To an audience that packed the Hippodrome theater at Goldfield Monday evening from top to bottom, Patrick L. Flanigan, candidate for United States senator; Hugh H. Brown, candidate for supreme court justice, and old Tom Fitch, discussed the issues of the campaign in truly a Republican spirit.

The meeting was more like an old-fashioned Republican love feast than a severe session dealing with the grave topics of the hour. The hundreds and hundreds of Goldfield people who were present were lavish in their applause, and enthusiasm at times ran to the pitch where even hand-clapping and cheers did not suffice. Shouts of "bravo," "good," and "go at 'em," etc., were frequently interspersed, while a bubbling spirit of good humor pervaded throughout the entire evening.

Senator Newlands wired from San Francisco that he would be back by the end of the week if Flanigan wasn't there.

Long before 8 o'clock, the hour set for the opening, the Hippodrome was filled, and by the time Flanigan approached the footlights there was not a vacant seat in the house, while scores were standing at the rear and in the aisles. On the stage besides Mr. Flanigan, Tom Fitch and Hugh Brown, were Colonel H. B. Maxson, candidate for congress; Senator Morehouse, J. S. Corregan, George Springmeyer, J. G. Thompson, J. F. Douglas, E. R. Collins, J. E. Slinkey, T. L. Flanigan, Dr. Birkenmeyer and

several others. C. C. Stanley was chairman.

Patrick Flanigan made a distinct impression, and his remarks were frequently broken by wild applause. The sincerity of his address and his exposure of those who are trying to prevent his election by dark and devious methods, encountered a responsive chord in the audience. His reception was both warm and cordial, and after the meeting had adjourned he shook hands with dozens who congratulated him upon his position in politics.

Mr. Flanigan said that if elected to the United States senate he would accomplish more for the state of Nevada in one year than has Newlands in the past sixteen years.

"Newlands wants only your votes," said he. "He can not go into my own county and carry it, even if he should spend a quarter of a million dollars to defeat me."

**JUDGE BROWN'S REMARKS.**  
Hugh Brown, quiet, deeply intense in his earnestness and eloquent to a degree, was introduced as a man for whom the people of this county should vote, irrespective of their various political beliefs. Mr. Brown made a masterly address, in which he first showed that southern Nevada is entitled to representation on the supreme bench, and then took up Bryan and Taft personally, showing that while the first is a mere dreamer, the Republican candidate for the presidency is a man who has done great deeds.

## F. Y. WILLIAMS HAS GONE TO ETERNAL REST

### PROMINENT AND HONORED CITIZEN OF TONOPAH DIED ON TRAIN AT HAZEN.

F. Y. Williams, manager of the Lathrop-Davis company and treasurer and secretary of the Southern Nevada Consolidated Telephone and Telegraph company, passed to the eternal rest last evening while en route to Sacramento. A fortnight ago Mr. Williams suffered a stroke of apoplexy and since that time his condition had failed to improve. His physicians decided that the only chance to save his life was to take him to a lower altitude and yesterday morning he left for Sacramento, accompanied by Mrs. Williams and his two sons. When the train reached Wabuska he was in a sinking condition and he passed away just as the train was pulling into Hazen. The body will be taken to Sacramento, where interment will take place.

Mr. Williams was born July 25, 1853, in Virginia, Placer county, California. In 1871 he moved to Sacramento and accepted a position as bookkeeper in the People's bank of that city. In 1873 he resigned this position to accept a higher one in the Capital bank, which position he held until 1881, when he entered the employ of Hall, Luhrs and company, wholesale grocers. On account of his integrity and ability he was soon promoted to the position of confidential bookkeeper, which place he filled until 1903, when he came to Tonopah to accept the management of the Lathrop-Davis company.

He was a quiet, unassuming gentleman, and one of Tonopah's most enterprising and public-spirited citizens. There was never a call for charity that he did not respond to liberally, and his generous acts, which were many, are known to none save himself. He was foremost in all movements that were for the betterment of the community in which he lived, and no person in need of succor had to ask twice.

The Tonopah volunteer fire department, of which he was an honored member, will display their flag at half mast until after the funeral ceremony.

Mr. Williams is survived by a widow, two sons, Russell and Donald, a married daughter and a sister, Mrs. Ernest Hall of Manhattan.

## WALTER MOORE KILLED WHILE PROSPECTING

ONE OF THE PIONEER MINERS OF SOUTHERN NEVADA HAS UNTIMELY END.

"I am going to make a big fortune or die in the attempt." These were the words of Walter Moore, one of the pioneers of Goldfield, to Diamondfield Jack Davis three months ago as Moore started out on a prospecting trip. On Monday word was received by wire that he had accidentally shot and killed himself at Stewarts Springs, fifteen miles northeast of Mina. The information as to the tragedy was meagre, but it is supposed that in loading his camping wagon a rifle was accidentally discharged, with fatal results. He was accompanied on the trip by Earl Hike, of Goldfield, who was the only witness to the tragedy.

Deceased was 36 years of age and was one of the pioneers of the Goldfield country, and shared in the Klondyke rush with Jim Butler. He was also one of the owners of the Pine Nut property at Manhattan, from which he cleared a comfortable fortune. At one time he was in the livery stable business at Goldfield, a member of the firm of Moore and O'Brien. Some time ago he was married to Miss Nellie O'Brien, a sister of Pat O'Brien, the lady having been engaged in teaching school at Delmar. The widow and a young son are residing at Berkeley, California. Deceased is survived by three brothers, John and Billy Moore of Morey, and Eldred Moore. Senator Bell of Tonopah was an uncle. The remains will probably be buried at the Bell ranch, where his father is interred.
