

NEWLANDS ADDRESSED DEMOCRATS

Dickerson, Newlands and Talbot the Heavy Guns at a Democratic Rally Monday Night---Newlands Dodged the Questions

The Democrats had a rally in this city Monday night, at which Acting Governor Dickerson and Sir Francisco Coldfoot Newlands were the particular bright and shining luminaries in the constellation of Democratic county candidates and officials grouped upon the stage of the pavilion for the delectation of the dear public. Judge G. S. Talbot, Democratic nominee for the supreme bench was also there, and he and Walter Cole alone averted the heavy frost which threatened the meeting. The pavilion was about three-fourths filled, for the chairs but about two-thirds filled the room, and there were a few men standing back of the chairs. "Standing room only" was more due to shortage of chairs than to size of the audience. And, by the way, something like one fourth of the audience was composed of the fair sex. Then, too, the dog deserves mention, for one of the most interesting diversions of the evening was the visit of a medium-sized black dog to the stage. The pup visited each of the candidates, sniffed around them, and then, in evident disapproval, hurriedly "beat it," while the audience cheered. The strains of "Dixie," played by the band, also drew applause—and that was about the only time the cheering was anything but perfunctory. The handclappers evidently had not properly learned their cues, or had not been paid in advance.

Acting Governor Dickerson was the first speaker introduced by Chairman Walter D. Cole, and indulged in a few platitudes, after which Clay Taliman, who wants to be state senator, told the audience why, in his opinion, he should be honored by enough votes to enable him to get his fingers in the legislative pie. Judge Talbot, Democratic candidate for the supreme bench, made a short but well received address, in which he stated that if southern Nevada is represented on the bench eastern Nevada will not be represented thereupon. He made a gentlemanly reference to his opponent upon the Republican ticket, Hugh Brown, as a gentleman whom he held in the highest esteem, both as to ability and character; made a few promises as to how he would equably administer the laws, and then resumed his seat. Walter Cole then took the floor again, and began a prelude as to some one who was one of the ten or less statesmen in the United States senate, a true American statesman. Senator Newlands was seen to glance inquiringly about the stage, as if to see some notable whom he had possibly overlooked, and when Mr. Cole ended by naming the Nevada Senator as the paragon to whom he had been referring the Senator grinned with satisfaction. A feeble handclapping and scuffling of feet greeted Mr. Newlands when he advanced to the front of the platform and commenced his speech. The address of Senator Newlands was almost entirely along the line of national politics, save at the first, when he declared that the reason why Nevada was progressive was that the Democrats had given her the eight-hour law, the initiative, the employer's liability act and other such legislation for the benefit of the people and the workmen. On national politics he gave Roosevelt credit for laboring for the good of the people, but stated that the Republican senators and congressmen were almost entirely against him, and that most of the beneficial work which had been enacted at his instigation was done only by the Democrats in congress supporting his measures.

NYE COUNTY GRAND JURY IS IN SESSION

The grand jury was empaneled yesterday by the order of Judge O'Brien and spent the entire day in looking over the evidence and examining one witness in the Frank Cicillini murder case of Round Mountain. The district attorney's office was represented by Walter D. Cole as acting district attorney, who is acting in that capacity during the absence of District Attorney P. A. McCarran. The Cicillini case will probably take several days to decide. H. W. Scheid was appointed by the court to defend the three men held by the coroner's jury, for the murder of Cicillini. Pat Flannigan, Tom Conifrey and William Turner, who are alleged to have stolen high grade ore from the MacNamara mine, which case will be investigated by the grand jury, were before that body in the afternoon in order that they might exercise challenges in case they had legitimate reason to believe that any of the members of the jury were prejudiced against them.

AN INTERESTING CHURCH SERVICE

The Salvation army occupied the pulpit of the Presbyterian church Sunday evening through the courtesy of Rev. Floyd E. Dorris, who at present is away. The meeting was largely attended and those present were treated to several recitations by Lieutenant Rogers, who is an elocutionist of note, and her rendition of "Flying Jim" brought forth words of praise and admiration from the entire congregation. Miss Rogers and Adjutant Bigney also sang several songs. The announcement was made that the army will hold regular meetings at the army hall just below the Nevada theater.
