

Gymnasium to Be Completed in One Week

On next Saturday the volunteer fire department gymnasium will be turned over to the trustees of that organization by V. Carlson, the contractor. The inside ceiling and walls have been finished and all of the electrical wiring installed. One of the improvements that the building committee has added is a proscenium arch over the entrance, where seventy-five people can be seated with comfort. A balcony has also been added over the front porch, which makes an ideal place for the band, and which will in all probability be used this coming summer for concerts. The porch lights on the outside have been placed and add somewhat to the beauty of the building.

The lavatories, shower baths and heating room will be finished this week. All the electrical wiring in the gymnasium is being donated by Messrs. Carr, Collins, Buckley and several other local electricians whose names have not been turned into the building committee. The plumbing will also be completed this week by Messrs. Lindsey and Darringer, who have kindly donated their services. A full list of those who have donated time, services and money will be published when the building is completed.

Although it has not been decided it is thought that on the opening night of the gymnasium a dance will be given by the volunteers.

ZACK TAYLOR'S DEATH WAS BY SUICIDE ROUTE

Concerning the death of Zack Taylor, formerly of this city, in Carson City Thursday, the News of that city says:

Zack Taylor, a gambler well known throughout the state, took an overdose of morphine last evening and died about 7:25. He only recently returned from Tonopah where he had been for some time. He had been very ill for some months, being a victim of the great white plague and during the last few days had grown very despondent. A short time ago he informed a friend that he was tired of it all and intended to kill himself. Since his return from Tonopah he has been staying with a friend, George Archer, in his cabin below the railroad freight depot from which place the body was removed to the M. J. Downey undertaking parlors.

The deceased was born and raised in this place and is survived by an aged mother residing here who was prostrated at the news of her son's death, when informed of the occurrence shortly after it happened. The old lady was not able to come into town last evening and will not see her son until the body is taken home today.

The deceased was about forty years of age and was a member of the Tonopah Eagles.

A MISTAKEN IDENTITY CASE
