## Three California Boys Perish in Cold and Snow Among the High Peaks of the Coast Range--Nevada Party Snowbound in the Sierras and is in Great Danger.

## THE HAYTIEN REVOLUTION IS ON AGAIN

PORT AU PRINCE (Hayti), Nov. 28.—Government troops under the command of General Celestin Cyrilaque, minister of war, and composed of young recruits who were sent out to capture the leader of the new revolution, General Antoine Simon, have met with a severe defeat. The engagement took place at Anseveau, which lies fifty-five miles east of Jeremie, one of the disaffected ports. After some fighting the government forces were routed and driven back to Miragoane, twenty miles distant.

VENTURA (Cal.), Nov. 28.—Frozen to death in a snow storm which covered the high peaks north of the Santa Clara valley, Wednesday night, the bodies of three Santa Paula boys were found late this afternoon after a search of two days. The boys, Clifford Tharp, aged 17; Cuba Tharp, aged 9, and John Blaes, aged 13, started out from home early Thursday morning to see the snow, intending to be home for Thanksgiving dinner. When night came the boys had not returned and the community was notified, and early Friday morning searching parties were organized. Late this afternoon, Henry Newman, a pumper at the local oil wells, and W. Hamlin, who had been searching all day, found the bodies at the head of Timber canyon, about ten miles from Santa Paula. The boys had evidently gotten into deep snow and becoming exhausted, perished from cold and hunger.

AUTO PARTY SNOWBOUND.  
RENO, Nov. 29.—Somewhere in the Sierra Nevada mountains above Virginia, Assemblyman Fitzpatrick and a party of mining friends are stranded in an automobile. The party left Fallon, Churchill county, yesterday, headed for Mono county to examine some oil lands. They were overtaken by a snowstorm in the high mountains, the roads were soon blocked and almost before they realized it their machine was stranded. A prospector brought the news of their plight to Virginia and a relief party has gone to the aid of the travelers.

## A MINE DISASTER NEAR PITTSBURG

### TROOPS LEAVING SCENE OF STRIKE

PERTHAMBOY (N. J.), Nov. 28.—Four of the six companies of state troops which have been on guard at the works of the National Fireproofing company at Keasboy, where rioting led to the shooting of six strikers by deputy sheriffs, were withdrawn tonight. An attempt to resume operations this morning was unsuccessful, the strikers failing to respond.

### ANOTHER TYPHOON FORMING.

MANILA, Nov. 29.—The weather bureau reports that another typhoon is forming somewhere between the Caroline Islands and the Philippine group, the general direction in which it is moving being to the north and east. It is expected that the storm will pass to the southward of Manila during the night.

A few minutes before the explosion Deputy State Mine Inspector Henry Louttit completed a two days' inspection, which revealed no cause for apprehension. He and General Manager Kerr of the company came to the surface a few minutes before 11. Mine Foreman Henry Thompson and two miners entered the cage and it was started toward the bottom of the 500-foot shaft. Suddenly there was an ominous rumbling, then a trembling of the ground around the mouth of the shaft as from an earthquake, and an instant later there was a terrific report, the cage was hurled up the shaft and through the roof of the shaft house, the mine foreman and the two men still in it. Their bodies were tossed through the top of the building and far beyond it. Thompson was dead when picked up and the others mortally injured. So great was the force of the explosion that shattered portions of the woodwork about the mouth of the shaft were blown into Ten Mile creek, 2000 feet away. Immediately following the explosion a dense column of smoke issued from the shaft and it was feared a fierce fire was raging at the bottom of the mine. ### 125 Men are Entombed and Probably Killed by Explo- sion in Marianna Coal Mine--No Hope of Res- cuing the Miners.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 28.—The last ray of hope for the rescue of any of the 125 or more miners who are entombed by an explosion in the Marianna mines of the Pittsburg-Buffalo Coal company shortly before noon today was dispelled at 8:30 tonight when the first rescuing party reached the workings and found dead bodies scattered about the floor of the mine. Few, if any, of the body were mutilated, the men undoubtedly smothered by deadly gases following the explosion. The bodies are not yet counted, but it is known there are at least 125 and the number may be larger. All but two of the bodies in the mine are said to be foreigners.

the Rachel and Agnes mines, in reality a double mine with underground connections. The cause of the explosion is undetermined. Two theories are entertained. One that a pocket of gas was struck by one of the miners, quickly filling the workings and then ignited from a lamp. The other theory is that gas from a well on the Fulton farm, under which the mine is located, penetrated the workings. Peter Arnold, was brought out alive from the Rachel shaft at midnight. Joseph Kearney, one of the rescuing party, reported other men alive. Arnold was found unconscious 100 feet from the Agnes shaft. When he reached the surface he said the explosion occurred close to the Agnes shaft.

### GUILTY OF WIFE MURDER

SALT LAKE (Utah), Nov. 28.—A jury today found Thomas Vance, a junk dealer of Salt Lake, guilty on a charge of wife murder. Judge Armstrong will pronounce sentence Thursday. The case against Vance was based on a complaint that his wife, who died in a local hospital December last, had long been subjected to brutal punishment, and that Vance the day before his wife's removal to the hospital had administered mercurial poison to hasten her death.

## Cowardly Murder in Portland

PORTLAND (Ore.), Nov. 28.—With the words, "Hello, Ralph," as a salutation, J. A. Finch this afternoon walked into the private office of Ralph B. Fisher, the chairman of the grievance committee of the Oregon State Bar association, and giving his victim but time to partly turn his head, he shot Fisher dead. Finch was recently suspended from practicing law for having appeared in court in an intoxicated condition, and having forged the name and notarial seal of his law partner to an affidavit. Fisher, as chairman of the grievance committee, had prosecuted Finch. Finch, it appears, was seeking to be provisionally reinstated, the provision being that he be allowed to practice so long as he committed no unprofessional act. He sought Fisher's signature to the petition and the prosecutor refused to sign the document. This afternoon he went to Fisher's office, where, after he had hailed Fisher with "Hello, Ralph," he fired three shots. The first hit Fisher in the back of the head and inflicted a flesh wound; the second missed its mark and shattered a window, but the third struck Fisher in the right temple and death resulted instantly. After the shooting Finch replaced his weapon in his hip pocket and walked out of the office to the elevator. His way was barred by other tenants in the building who heard the shooting. Finch, when taken to the police station, denied having seen Fisher at all today, and professes to know nothing about the shooting.

### THE RACE RIOT CASES COLLAPSE

SPRINGFIELD (Ills.), Nov. 28.—The acquittal today of two more defendants is generally regarded as forecasting the collapse of the cases growing out of the recent race riots. A verdict of not guilty was brought in by the jury in the case of William and Mabel Stout, who have been on trial on an indictment charging them with burglary and larceny.

## THE ARMY DEFEATS THE NAVY

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 28.—In one of the fiercest football games seen on Franklin Field this year the Army vanquished the Navy this afternoon by a score of 6 to 4. Thirty thousand persons witnessed the game, which never lagged. The strength of the Army fairly overwhelmed the Cadets. The Army victory, notwithstanding the strength shown, was due more to a misjudged punt by one of the Navy's backs than to good work of the team. All the scoring was done in the early part of the first half.

### UNITED STATES MINISTER TO NICARAGUA RESIGNS

MANAGUA (Nicaragua), Nov. 28.—John Garner Coolidge, the American minister to Nicaragua, today tendered his resignation. It is reported here that Mr. Coolidge took this step because of disapproval of his government in meddling with the internal affairs of Nicaragua. Mr. Coolidge is also resigning from the diplomatic service.

### MINING ENGINEER IS ROBBED OF \$3800

KANSAS CITY (Mo.), Nov. 28.—Martin H. Holloran, a mining engineer, who came to Kansas City from Pittsburg two months ago, was attacked by two men last night and robbed of \$3800.

### SIX KILLED IN A SALT MINE

DETROIT (Mich.), Nov. 28.—Six men employed by the Oakwood Contracting company were suffocated today in the village of Oakwood, outside the western outskirts of Detroit. The men were working 350 feet down a shaft being sunk for a salt mine when the canvas tube that supplied them with air became clogged and the shaft filled with gases.

### HUNDREDS OF SAILORS LAND.

MANILA, Nov. 29.—Twelve hundred men of the Atlantic fleet were granted shore liberty by Admiral Sperry today. They landed during a driving rainstorm in the afternoon, the bad weather forcing the abandonment of the out-of-door portions of the reception program.

## THE MINNIE HEALY SUIT IS SETTLED

BUTTE (Mont.), Nov. 28.—In the district court today W. W. Wishon was awarded \$1 damages in his case against Miles Finlen, involving an option on the famous Minnie Healy mine, over which property the noted copper war between F. Augustus Heinze and the Amalgamated Copper had its inception. On the second count, in which Wishon asked for \$7142, the court decided against the plaintiff, holding it was Finlen's good fortune to receive \$131,250 from the Boston-Montana company for the options, as "they had expired and were worthless."
