

# PRESIDENT MOYER VISITS LOCAL MINERS

Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, with headquarters at Denver, arrived from the north yesterday morning and will leave this morning for Goldfield, and after spending a day there will continue to his home in Denver. He has been in Nevada since the first of the month and since that time has been visiting the local unions.

Mr. Moyer spent several days in Carson, where he investigated the case of Preston and Smith, who are serving long terms in the state penitentiary for the killing of a restaurant keeper named Silva in Goldfield during the labor troubles there several years ago. He stated that a petition will be presented to the board of pardons when it meets in January, asking for the pardon of the two convicted murderers. Preston's mother and sister are in Carson and are working for his release.

Mr. Moyer addressed the local miners' union last night and was greeted with great applause.

# ELKS MINSTRELS GAVE SHOW THAT WAS A HUMMER

The Goldfield Elks minstrels arrived in Tonopah yesterday 100 strong and last night at the Eagles' pavilion presented one of the best shows seen here for some time. There is a chance that Goldfield fails to appreciate home talent, but it is far different in Tonopah, and every act and stunt on the entire program met with applause and plaudits that fairly shook the building.

The stage was a bower of electric lights in the colors of the order, blue and white, and the background represented a huge dial of a clock with the hands pointing to 11 o'clock, the hour in which the absent brothers are honored. Milton M. Detch acted as interlocutor, while the bones and tambos were Ole Elliot, Dick Colburn, Ed Hogan, Jack Marrison, Tom Hurley, Pat Carney, Walter Stone and Art Slaght. All took their part to perfection and the jokes sprung were good. There were many hits on the Tonopah Elks and each was well applauded. The song, "You've Done Broke Down," by Jack Merriman, was rendered in a tone that would make a real black face comedian turn white with envy. Dr. Ducey presented "By the Old Oaken Bucket, Louise" in a manner that proved surprising.

Ed Hogan had a comical song, "If They Only Let Poor Adam's Rib Alone." The songs of W. E. Blair, Walter Stone and W. Walker were all encored several times. Ole Elliot made the hit of the evening when he sang "When Highland Mary Did the Highland Fling." Ole was attired something on the plan of a Scottish maiden who was raised south of Market and his foot work beat that of Spider Welsh. His stunt brought down the house, but he refused to make his second appearance and sent his regrets, explaining that his abbreviated attire was somewhat chilly. Tom Hurley sang "Don't Take Me Home," and got off a number of hits on Tonopah people. The finale of the first part was a regular pyrotechnic display for each black face artist produced from nowhere a string of electric lights of the colors of the organization, which made a rather dazzling view.

The second part was full of vaudeville turns and every act was novel. "The Mikadoo" was presented and the costumes were wonderful, especially those of the sweet Japanese maidens. Then there was the Sandow impersonation in which Dr. D. A. Turner appeared as Madam Fluff de Ruff. The strong man juggled cannon balls, 500 pound weight and the madam with an ease that was astonishing.

Al Pape of Reno did some fancy rope skipping and his makeup as a school girl had the bald headed row going. The Eight Hobos on the Road was a satire of tramp life and here Ole Elliot made his second hit as "Sanitary Tom, the Banker." The "bo's" evidently had had the necessary experience for they were rather natural and some what resembled the regular water tank traveler.

The Tonopah Elks were present in force and the house was fairly crowded. The minstrels had their own special orchestra, which is one of the best in southern Nevada, and each accompaniment was a masterpiece in itself.

After the Elks minstrels last evening Milton M. Detch, district deputy of the state of Nevada and past exalted ruler of the Goldfield lodge of Elks, tendered a banquet to the minstrel band and a number of his friends. The spread was served in the Mizpah grill and about forty persons were served. There were toasts, songs and stories and the excellent viands served made the party a jolly one. It was nearly morn when the guests arose and a parting tribute was paid to the mammoth minstrels of the Goldfield Elks.

## NEW COMPANY HAS A HUGE CAPITALIZATION

Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday at the county clerk's office of the Mogul Consolidated Mines company, with a capitalization of \$10,000,000. This is one of the largest incorporated companies in Nevada and the cost of filing the articles at the secretary of state's office will be \$1000. One of the main holdings of the company is the Mogul mine, situated at Ray, which is about ten miles north of Tonopah. They have been shipping ore from that property for some time and recently have made several good strikes.
