

"STRIPES" RICE IS OUSTED FROM GOODWIN CONCERN

New York World Aerates Record of George Graham Rice---Herzig and New York Curb Agency Refuses Goodwin Company Membership

A sensational account of how George Graham Rice, formerly of Reno, one of the principal members of the Nat Goodwin Brokerage company, and editor of the Nevada Mining News, was forced to resign from the vice presidency of the Rawhide Coalition Mining company is contained in a recent issue of the New York World. According to the World, Rice's resignation was forced by reason of his proven prison record and former shady transactions. In speaking of the affair the World says:

"Following the sensational break in the Rawhide Coalition Mines company stock, of which Nat Goodwin is treasurer, came yesterday an announcement by the New York curb agency that it would no longer consider desirable as officers any company whose stock was dealt in any person who had been convicted of any criminal offense at any time.

"Immediately upon the transference of this notice from the curb to the Rawhide company George Graham Rice, second vice president, resigned his position. It is said that Mr. Goodwin was hurrying from Cincinnati to protect both investors and their stock.

"The objectionable element in the Rawhide Coalition, it was understood, was George Graham Rice, a breezy promotionist, who tried schemes in many parts before he essayed Wall street. He has had more than a few fortunes gathered in a short time and as quickly dissipated. East and west and south, under some corporate name he has planned alluring things, mounting his receipts into sums approximating the million mark and then in some flying leap for the pinnacle of the million, just failed in reaching it, sometimes by reason of outside ventures and sometimes through the actions of the postoffice department in stopping them."

According to the World Rice has admitted his prison record and in speaking of this matter the New York paper says:

"Yesterday afternoon in his luxurious apartments at the Patterson he accepted the situation with a philoso-

phy possibly begotten of experience. He admitted that fifteen years or more ago, when he was young, he had been sent to the Elmira reformatory, afterwards to prison, but the offenses, he said, had their origin in family troubles and these he had outlived.

According to E. W. King, president of Rawhide Coalition, Rice's resignation means his elimination from the prominent position he has held in promoting and floating the company. Rice, whose real name is Simon Jacob Herzig, but who dropped it after the family troubles that got him in prison, later became president and general manager of the Maxim and Gay company, the most profitable tipster concern ever formed.

"They began by advertising a long shot on the races free and from that beginning made much money. They purchased a newspaper, now defunct, and ran tipping bureaus and commission offices in nearly all the states. Rice went broke in outside speculation and then went to Nevada where advertising and promoting won him new fortunes."

THE NEW GOLD COINS ARRIVE

R. T. Harris, cashier of the Nevada First National bank, yesterday received a number of the new coins of the revised St. Gauden type. They bear the motto "In God We Trust," which was left off the first assortment struck off. On those of the \$5. denomination, and \$2.50 denomination the lettering and designs instead of being in relief is embedded. On the tails side the words "United States of America" are at the top, over the trausered eagle. To the left of the eagle is "E Pluribus Unum." To the right is the "In God We Trust." At the bottom is the denomination. There is a difference between the \$10 coins and the smaller ones in that the "In God We Trust" and "E Pluribus Unum" are reversed from one side to the other. The word liberty on the larger coins appears on the head band of the Indian while on the smaller coins it appears at the top over the head.

There are very few of the coins in circulation and it is believed that they will be recalled before they get into the line of trade.
