National Bank Affairs are in Fine Condition

The regular annual meeting of the stockholders of the Nevada First National bank was held yesterday afternoon in the offices of the bank and the following were elected directors of the institution: Malcolm L. Macdonald, Lewis A. Parkhurst, Donald B. Gillies, Key Pittman, John G. Kirchen, James H. Monteath, of Tonopah; Hon. W. A. Clark of Montana; H. G. Bragdon, of Goldfield, and E. A. Montgomery of Los Angeles. Following the election of the directors that body held a meeting and qualified for the offices and then examined into the affairs of the bank, which were found to be more than satisfactory. The amount of money which is required to be held in reserve, by the comptroller of the United States treasury, was far in excess and the deposits also showed a material increase over the last report.

Following the inspection of the bank the directors met and elected the following as officers of the bank: Malcolm L. Macdonald, president; Donald B. Gillies; Lewis A. Parkhurst; Key Pittman, vice presidents; R. T. Harris, cashier.

Jack P. Donahue, who was brought in from Manhattan Monday night by Deputy Sheriff Martinson, on the charge of having attempted to kill H. J. Humphrey, was tried yesterday in the justice court, and was sentenced to serve four months in the county jail on the charge of carrying a concealed weapon. He was arrested in Manhattan Saturday night after he had twice snapped his revolver at Humphreys, but luckily the weapon failed to explode. Donahue has been in trouble several times in the northern camp and the reduction of the charges against him came as a surprise, as it was thought he would be tried on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill.

THE RAILROADS GAVE REBATES

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12.—The Santa Fe railroad company was found guilty before the state railroad commission today of carrying oil shipments between Bakersfield and this city for the Associated Oil company at a lower rate than fixed by state law, and fined \$5000 by unanimous vote of the commissioners. The railroad has been carrying oil for the Associated Oil company at a rate of 25 cents per barrel, the legal rate being 37.8 cents per barrel. The board also found the Southern Pacific guilty of discrimination in freight rates on six counts, but no penalty was fixed.

SENATE PASSES BILL FOR BIG TREE PARKS

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—For acquiring all private holdings in the Sequoia and General Grant national parks, which comprise the big trees and other wonders, the senate today passed a bill appropriating \$90,000.

PITTSBURG IS DIFFERENT FROM SAN FRANCISCO

(By Associated Press.) PITTSBURG, Jan. 12.—Charles S. Cameron, president of the Tube City Railroad company, who has been on trial for several days, charged with attempting to bribe former Councilman William Martin, in connection with the passage of franchise ordinances this afternoon was found guilty. The jury was out fifteen minutes.

Attorneys for Cameron gave notice of appeal for new trial, and he was held in \$20,000 bail. Former Councilman Martin, who is serving a penitentiary sentence for accepting a bribe from C. R. Richardson, a broker, was one of the principal witnesses.

STOCK MARKETS STILL INACTIVE

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Selling pressure continued in evidence in stock transactions today, but it was in a spotty and fitful way. E. H. Harriman appeared at his office for the first time since the Christmas holiday, and there put an end to talk of his serious illness, which was made in an effort to depress prices. With these changes which have been aggravating the weakness of stocks, the bear element took on a share of caution and increased reserves in the way in which they pushed operations. The result was seen in a decrease of activity in the market and a disposition to take stocks and concessions to cover shorts. Buying was unaggressive and did not pursue an advance of prices. Bonds were irregular.

RECOMMENDS BUILDING OF TWO BATTLESHIPS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—An increase of the navy to the extent of \$29,000,000 was agreed upon today by the house committee on naval affairs. The program includes two battleships of 26,000 tons displacement, \$14,000,000.
