The cross examination of Letson Balliet was under way at the time court adjourned.

STOCK MARKET

The advance of 1/4 of a cent in yesterday's quotations on silver is given as the cause for the raise in Tonopah stocks. The feature was Tonopah Mining, which gained 12 1/2 points. Belmont was next in line and closed at .86, 6 points higher than the closing of the preceding day. West End went up 2 points, while Montana, MacNamara and Midway each closed 1 point stronger. The recent strike in Mayflower advanced that Bullfrog stock to .16, the highest point reached by that stock in several months.

AUTOMOBILES WILL CONVEY MAIL TO MANHATTAN

GOVERNMENT HAS AWARDED
CONTRACT TO AUTO STAGE
COMPANY.

The mail contract between this city and Manhattan has been let to the Tonopah-Manhattan Auto Stage company and as soon as the bond is approved the mail will be conveyed to the northern camp by autos.

The line will be under the management of T. A. Patterson, Jr., who will have his local office at the Palace hotel. The company will erect a station house at a central point between here and Manhattan, which will have

telephone connection, and autos that are stranded can easily tap the telephone line and ask for assistance.

The schedule for the carrying of the mail announces that the cars will leave Tonopah at 1 o'clock p. m. daily, while the start from Manhattan must be made at 6 o'clock in the morning.

RAILROAD CASE TO BE APPEALED

If the Tonopah and Goldfield railroad can prevent it, the recent decision of Justice Henley of the justice court, which is to the effect that that road is liable to W. H. Parker for the sum of \$299, will not stand. An appeal was filed in the district court yesterday by Hugo Wilkerson and Campbell, Metson and Brown, protesting against the justice's ruling and seeking the judgment of the higher tribunal.

The case is one of extreme importance to railroad corporations in this state. Parker shipped twelve boxes from Austin to Goldfield and only eleven were delivered here. The railroad gave a receipt for the full amount of the transportation and said it would find the missing box.

The road claimed in court that it was not liable inasmuch as the loss was not proven to have occurred on its line. The court held that the giving of the receipt made the line liable. The case will establish a precedent. —Goldfield Tribune.

MEDIEVAL RAGE NOW PREVAILS

CHICAGO, March 11.—"Women of fashion do not live in vain. Their sartorial creations endure through the ages, even as the inspired works of poets and philosophers and sculptors endure. Their brilliancy is not as shortlived as scoffing cynics make it out to be. The remark someone made about Shakespeare might be applied—they are not of an age, but for all time." These are the conclusions drawn

by dressmakers following the revival of medieval costumes as officially announced at the annual gathering. Styles of the fourteenth and preceding centuries are now on exhibition at the convention, which was formally opened today.
