## SULTAN IS PREPARING TO FLEE

### Last Reports From Constantinople State That Sultan Will Abdicate

#### Young Turks are Encamped Within 20 Miles of the City and Will Advance Today.

#### Russian Cruiser Waiting to Escort the Sultan to Place of Safety--No Excitement Manifested in Capital

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 19.—The report that the sultan, Abdul Hamid had abdicated, created an intense excitement here today. This was followed by the rumor that he had fled on a warship, but so far no confirmation of either has been obtained. One report stated he had taken refuge in the British embassy and that a crowd had surrounded it, and that similar conditions prevailed at the Russian embassy. Both ambassadors and the Turkish foreign office denied all rumors and the ambassadors declared they had no knowledge of the movement of the sultan. His abdication within a few days is considered likely in well informed circles and the acceptance by constitutionalists of Prince Yusof Izzedin as the successor is expected as the sultan is under displeasure. The palace is guarded by a strong force of troops today and no one is permitted to enter, and even the high government officials are barred. General Husni Pasha, commanding the constitutional forces, has encamped from twenty to thirty thousand soldiers within twenty miles of Constantinople. Scouting parties approached to the gates of the capital today but experienced no resistance. It is believed that a fight is unlikely save at the palace. More troops are joining Husni hourly. It is believed he will not approach nearer until he is able to come with overwhelming numbers.

Except for the promotions to fill the vacancies of the 200 slain officers there is no activity around the war ministry and no preparations have been made to meet the advance of the Salonki troops. The city is quiet and the American and English women are driving about as usual. It is officially announced the death lists of the Adana riots numbered 400, many being Turks. It is believed if the abdication is brought about the proclamation of a successor will be accomplished without bloodshed.

BERLIN, April 19.—Dispatches from Constantinople state that Rehad Effendi has been acclaimed sultan at Saloki, Salonki, the provisional capital there. The Young Turks circles here are informed the troops will proceed to Constantinople Tuesday.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 19.—Orders have been issued to transport 6000 troops to Anatolia. This means the withdrawal before the advance of the Young Turks.

PARIS, April 19.—It is reported that the Young Turks have given the sultan until 10 p. m. to abdicate. Russian Ambassador Zinovieff is conducting the negotiations. The Russian cruiser Greig is lying in the osphorus to take off the sultan.

### DR. GARNER FILES RESTRAINING INJUNCTION

Yesterday morning Dr. Garner of Rawhide was to have filed with the district court in Goldfield a restraining order from interfering with the operations of the Bovard mines. Dr. Garner is out on \$5000 bonds, he being charged with stealing amalgam from the Weiss mill at Rawhide. When interviewed at Goldfield he said:

"I secured an option on four claims of the Bovard Gold Mining company. I was to pay so much each month on this option. I paid the first month's bills, and then there came up a suit for wages instituted by those who had been employed on the property. These people tied up the claims by labor liens and seriously embarrassed me. However, my contract relieved me of making any payments under the option so long as there was any litigation threatening the property. I had sixteen men at work, and when the liens were enforced the men were told to get out. Then there was an attachment placed on the mill and an attachment was also sought for the bullion produced by myself on the property. This bullion was valued at from \$4000 to \$5000. That same morning I left for Schurz on business and the impression gained strength that I had decamped from Rawhide with this bullion in my possession—just as if I wanted to skip the country with a lot of gold bars. I drove in a team to Schurz and a number of officers pursued me in a chartered automobile. My bonds were quickly made out, and on Tuesday I expect to show up the true situation. I want to return to work on the property, and will tomorrow seek the district court for a writ allowing me to proceed."

### BULL LEADERS ARE FORCED TO COMBINE

CHICAGO, April 19.—The bullish tendency in the wheat pit was on the wane today. The bull leaders were forced to combine to check the general selling movement that was brought about. This change was due to a heavy movement from Russia, whence 2,055,000-bushels came from last week. July options touched 1.15 7-8 and closed at 1.16 1-4; May closed at 1.27; September closed at 1.07. The tone of the market was weak at the close.

### BOSTON HAS AN ATTACK OF MARATHONITIS

BOSTON, April 19.—Henry Renaud, the French Canadian, defeated a large field in a full distance Marathon race held by the Boston Athletic association today, winning it in 2:53 4-5. Johnson of New York was second, and P. J. Grant of Brooklyn was third. Despite the climbing of a long hill Renaud made his finish like a short distance runner, with a wonderful burst of speed.

### UNWRITTEN LAW WILL NOT FIGURE IN DEFENSE

FLUSHING, April 19.—The unwritten law will not figure in the defense of Captain Peter Hains, Jr., when he will be tried for the murder of W. E. Annis last August, according to a statement from J. F. McIntyre, chief counsel of the defense today. Insanity will be the plea. He said he would not call alienists and would leave the jury to decide from his actions. Of the fifty veniremen examined, but two have been passed to the jury box.

### CURTAINMENT OF COPPER OUTPUT DENIED BY RYAN

BUTTE, April 19.—John D. Ryan, managing director of the Amalgamated Copper company, stated last night that there would be no curtailment of the copper output of the Butte mines as far as he was able to judge at the present time, and that the output of the Amalgamated Mines at present is normal. Mr. Ryan has just returned to Butte from New York.

### TAX-DODGING TOO MUCH FOR HIS CONSCIENCE

MARYSVILLE (Kan.), April 19.—Because he had not listed all his property with the county assessor and feared that an investigation might cause him to be sent to the state penitentiary, James Clarke, 55 years of age, a wealthy farmer near here, drowned himself in the Blue river. His body was found today. In a note to his younger brother, Stuart Clarke, the man stated he had failed to list \$25,000 worth of notes. After stating his fears regarding prosecution, Clarke wrote, "Go to church, never tell a lie, always keep employed and never drink whisky."

### EVIDENCE OF CALHOUN WITNESS CONFLICTS

#### Former Supervisor Nichols Recollects Before Offered \$4000 to Vote for Trolley Franchise.

#### When He Testified at Glass Trial Said He Had No Recollection of the Affair.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19.—Today's session of Judge Lawlor's court, where Patrick Calhoun is on trial for the bribery of former Supervisor F. P. Nicholas, was taken up mainly by the argument of the opposing counsel on the admissibility to record of statements made by Nicholas when he first told the story of the passage of the franchise desired by the United Railroads. During the cross examination of Nicholas Friday, Earl Rogers brought out an inconsistent statement of the witness when compared with his evidence in the trial of Louis Glass. Then Nicholas said he did not recollect if Supervisor Gallagher had offered him \$4000 to vote in favor of the trolley franchise. In the present trial he said he did so recollect. On redirect examination Heney endeavored to get into record the stenographic report of the first so-called confession of Nicholas prior to the Glass trial. This was combatted by the defense but was finally allowed by the court under the limitation that it was not for any other purpose than to show the similarity of Nicholas' statement then and in the present trial. Nicholas was turned over to the defense for the second cross examination just prior to adjournment. He is expected to occupy the stand all day tomorrow.

### WILL PROSECUTE THOSE IMPLICATED IN LYNCHING

GUTHRIE, April 19.—Governor Haskell declared tonight that those implicated in the Ada lynching will be prosecuted. An official investigation is promised. Adjutant General Ganton said that J. B. Miller killed thirteen men in Texas to his personal knowledge and escaped punishment.

### HUMBOLDT OPAL BEDS SAID TO BE VALUABLE

During the past few weeks jewelers have had cut and mounted a number of opals from the opal deposits on Thousand creek, northwest of Winnemucca. The milk used by the sufferers was examined by State Chemist W. S. Frisbie and State Dairy Commissioners H. R. Wright, but no trace of ptomaines was found.
