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## COPPER PRODUCTION.

The production of copper on the American continent is now at record figures, notwithstanding the low price. This is largely due to the fact that nearly 10,000,000 pounds per month of low cost copper is now coming from the low-grade concentrating propositions in Utah and Nevada, and this new production is to a considerable degree responsible for the fact that production is exceeding consumption. During March there was an increase of 11,557,000 pounds of copper output as compared with February.

The Boston News Bureau figures the production in the United States, Mexico and Canada, based on reports from camps, mines and smelters, for the month of March at 107,961,369 pounds. These figures do not take into consideration any copper from South America or other countries, except Mexico and Canada, which accounts for a good share of the 10,000,000 pounds' discrepancy between mine production figures and the refinery figures as given by the Producers' association.

We compare mine production with previous months for three years, as follows:

The only restriction in production at present is at Butte and in Arizona. These two districts, each of which, under ordinary conditions, outputs at the rate of 30,000,000 pounds per month, are at present 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 pounds per month under the normal output.

## T. & G. RAILROAD CANNOT CHANGE TIME SCHEDULE

### PROMOTION COMMITTEE WILL PETITION RAILWAY COMMISSION.

The committee appointed by the Tonopah Promotion association to wait on the officials of the Tonopah and Goldfield railway has been informed that it is not within the jurisdiction of the company to make the change without first securing the sanction of the state board of railway commissioners. In accordance with this, the committee will circulate the following petition today for signatures which will then be forwarded to the railway commission: "To the Honorable Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of Nevada.

"Gentlemen—A committee from the Tonopah Promotion association, representing the people of Nye county, waited on the railroad officials of the Tonopah and Goldfield Railroad company, asking them to consider the advisability of changing their schedule so far as to have train No. 23 for San Francisco leave here in the evening instead of the morning as it does at present, and were informed by these officials that it was not within their jurisdiction to make this change without the consent of the board of railroad commissioners, although they would be willing to do so.

"We therefore petition your honorable body to grant our request for such change in schedule as it is a matter of great convenience to this section of the state, as well as being more comfortable, to travel over the desert at night, particularly so during the summer season.

### COW BURNED BY LIVE WIRE.

Sunday night during the electric storm a tree blew down in a field near the prison and carried with it the electric power lines. The wires in dropping hit a cow that was in the field and burned her quite severely before she could be extricated. The howling of the suffering animal brought a number of men to her assistance and word was gotten to the power plant and the juice shut off until she could be freed and the wires placed in a position of safety to the public. The city was in darkness for a short time while this was being done.—Carson News.

## NEW PNEUMATIC DREDGE EN ROUTE TO MANHATTAN

### NEW APPARATUS WILL BE INSTALLED ON PROPERTY OF "DRY WASH" WILSON.

Word was received in Manhattan Tuesday by wire from Sacramento that the Pneumatic Dredge company of that city was loading a complete outfit on the cars which would be shipped to Manhattan and be placed in operation on the Wilson ground in the main gulch. This action is the result of the visit of M. A. Nurse, president of the dredge company, and Dr. A. M. McCollum, one of the directors, who spent several days last week in the placer camp.

"Dry Wash" Wilson, who is interested in the new mode of extracting the values from placer dirt, stated he has completed arrangement for the installing of the machinery on a block of ground near Central, in which the dredge company and himself are interested. The plant will handle 500 yards of gravel a day with ease, and if pressed it is believed that the capacity will reach 1000 yards. There is an abundance of water and the power will in all likelihood be electricity that will be furnished by the power company, which expects to have its lines in operation at an early date.

## LARGE CROWD WITNESSES ONE ROUND BOUT

### TWO UNKNOWN INDULGE IN A FISTIC COMBAT TO SETTLE DISPUTE.

A lively one-round scrap took place about 6 o'clock last evening near the Tonopah and Goldfield depot which attracted a large crowd of spectators. For a time it looked as though a general mix-up would result, but friends interfered and the belligerents were separated. The names of the participants was not learned.
