**D. R. C. BROWN TO BUY THE BIG PIONEER MINES**

**The Purchaser Proposes to Work Every Claim in Mining Manner---He is a Colorado Millionaire.**

GOLDFIELD, May 4.—This week should bring an official statement to the effect that D. R. C. Brown, the millionaire mine owner of Aspen, Colorado, who was in Goldfield a few days ago, has purchased several large interests in Pioneer, the new camp to the south, including control of the famous Pioneer Mining company, which corporation is largely responsible for the birth of the town.

When Mr. Brown was in Goldfield he stated frankly that he was looking for a mine—not a prospect—and that he would divide his time between Pioneer and Goldfield. He slipped down to Pioneer and then as quietly continued east and returned to Denver. As to whether he will make any announcement regarding the acquisition of any Goldfield property is not known at this time. Mr. Brown undoubtedly has tremendous faith in Pioneer, and when the deals are closed he will probably set a pace for mining that will make even the old-timers sit up and take notice. He has ample capital of his own, and his associates are all men of big money. When he buys, he buys a producer.

Negotiations are said to be practically completed between Mr. Brown and the Tobin brothers for an outright sale of some of the larger Tobin holdings at Pioneer, including the Pioneer Mining company and the Conservative, on which Tex Rickard has just struck big ore.

The Tobin brothers say that tomorrow should see some sort of an official statement as to the exact situation. Once in control of these properties, Mr. Brown will put almost every foot under development, and will afford the leasers every consideration. Should the agreements go through as anticipated, all differences between interests at Pioneer, such as friction between the Pioneer and Conservative, and all matters involving apex propositions will be absolutely avoided.

**SIX JURORS ARE SECURED IN WANDELL CASE**

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**EMBEZZLEMENT CHARGE AGAINST W. F. FORD**

**FORMER TONOPAH ATTORNEY IS ACCUSED OF DEFRAUDING TWO INDIANS.**

The secret indictment that was returned against W. F. Ford, of Berkeley, charges him with embezzlement. Ford was arrested Monday night at his California home at the request of Sheriff Owens and will be brought to this city as soon as the legal requirements are complied with.

The indictment returned by the grand jury of this county reads in part as follows:

"The above named defendant, W. F. Ford, is accused by the grand jury of the county of Nye, state of Nevada, of a felony, to-wit: the crime of embezzlement, committed as follows, to-wit:

"That the said defendant, in the town of Tonopah, Nye county, Nevada, on or about the 26th day of September, 1908, and before the finding of this indictment, received from Edward Clifford, Sr., and the said Edward Clifford, Sr., did deliver to the said defendant the sum of \$5600, gold coin of the United States, for and in behalf of, and to be by the said defendant paid over to Johnny Peavine and Jim Farrington; and the said W. F. Ford did then and there unlawfully, feloniously and wrongfully convert all of the said money to his own use and benefit, with intent to defraud thereof the said Johnny Peavine and the said Jim Farrington, the lawful owners of the said money.

"All of which is contrary to the form, force and effect of the statute in such cases made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the people of the state of Nevada."

The witnesses who testified before the grand jury in connection with the case were Johnny Peavine, Jim Farrington, J. Falkenstein, Charles Richards, H. W. Scheld, Ed Clifford, Sr., and Ed Clifford, Jr.

It appears that Ford had been employed by the two Indians, Farrington and Peavine Johnny, to look after their interests when the Clifford property was sold several years ago.

The Indians were the original discoverers of the mine, but owing to the laws of the state prohibiting an Indian from making a location, they had the Cliffords locate the property. When the sale was made, the Indians were not counted in on the money, and they started suit through Ford. This suit was compromised.

When they testified before the grand jury they stated that they had not given Ford a power of attorney to collect money due on the notes from the Cliffords. Whether this is so remains to be seen when the case comes up for trial.

No word was received yesterday from Sheriff Owens and it is not known if his request for extradition papers will be granted by the governor of California.

**HUTCHISON GETS IN ON LUCKY BOY**

**TAKES OVER THE LE GRANDE LEASE—SAID TO BE EQUAL TO THE HUBBARD.**

Joe Hutchinson and E. S. Highley have secured a lease on the Mountain King property, known as the Le Grande lease, embracing the twenty-five feet of the Hubbard lease on the Mountain King, the whole of the Mountain Queen, adjoining the Mountain King on the west. The Mitchell-Fairfield lease, which expects to get into the shipping list this week, is at the east end of the Hubbard lease, whereas the two Goldfield men are at the west end of the same claim, which is said to have the ore body running directly through its center lines. There is a shaft down 225 feet and the claim is being worked with a whip that will be replaced with a 45-horsepower hoist as quickly as it can be installed, and work pushed down to the 600-foot level, according to the terms of the contract.

This lease is considered in every respect as good as the Hubbard lease, which is turning out such heavy shipments.

While reliable confirmation could not be obtained last night, it was rumored that the big deal which has

been hanging fire for some time looking to the passing of the title to the Lucky Boy and Alamo groups of claims at Lucky Boy, from Miller, Adams and Haller, to the United States Smelter company had finally been closed and the sale would actually be made some time during the present week, if indeed it has not already been made.

Information reached here yesterday to the effect that telegraphic advices received at Hawthorne pointed to the consummation of the deal, and that the first payment of \$1,500,000—the amount of the option—would be made within the next twenty or thirty days, and the whole sum be paid within four to six months time, according to the rumor.—Goldfield Tribune.

**INSANE WOMAN IS TAKEN TO THE STATE ASYLUM**

**DEPUTY SHERIFF DONAHUE TAKES MRS. HELEN KROEGER TO RENO.**

Mrs. Helen Kroeger, who was adjudged insane by a commission investigating her condition Monday evening at the district court, was taken to Reno yesterday morning under the charge of Deputy Sheriff Arthur Donahue, who will place her in the state asylum for the insane. Mrs. Kroeger, while confined in the county jail, was somewhat violent at times and it was feared that before the trip was over the officer would have to place her in a straight-jacket. She has relatives in Arizona who have been notified of her condition and some of them are expected to arrive here shortly. She owns a little property in this city.

**BUENOS AYRES STRIKE IS EXTENDING RAPIDLY**

BUENOS AYRES, May 4.—It is calculated that 200,000 men are out in the forty-eight hour strike in protest of the occurrences on May day when a number were killed in a battle between the people and the police. Six hundred arrests have been made. It is believed the strike will extend.
