

## GOLDEN ARROW IS BECOMING QUITE ACTIVE

LARGE NUMBER OF PROPERTIES ARE PREPARING FOR EXTENSIVE WORK.

Dick Jeffries and T. F. McCloskey, who are largely interested in the Golden Arrow district, are in town and will remain here several days securing supplies. Mr. Jeffries is operating a group of claims about two miles from Golden Arrow, and stated last evening that for the last week he has been able to secure good pinnings from a number of places on this property.

The Tell and Mitchell lease has a four-foot ledge that will average around \$30 to the ton. This rock they are placing on the dump to await better milling facilities. On the Glenn, Dorris and Dane property, three feet of \$18 ore is being worked and there is every chance that the ledge will continue to look better as the work of development continues. Glenn Snyder is securing excellent pinnings on his ground on Dead Horse hill. They report that a large number of different properties are being worked and that before long the entire district will be a scene of great activity as many of the companies have been financed in the east and owing to the late financial stringency, the capital was withdrawn, but now the owners are becoming interested once more and are preparing to conduct extensive development work.

Mr. McCloskey, who has spent the last few months at Clifford, stated that several parties were endeavoring to secure a lease on the main shaft of the property and there was a possibility of the Cliffords granting the lease. Coleman, Bonford and Larson have been granted a lease on the dump of the incline shaft and are in line to make quite a stake. This dump will average around \$80 to the ton.

## TOM KENDALL IS AN ENTHUSIAST OF LUCKY BOY

SAYS CAMP WILL SOON BE IN CONDITION TO STARTLE MINING WORLD.

"The Lucky Boy district is looking better every day," said Tom Kendall yesterday. Mr. Kendall has spent the last two weeks in that district, and during that time has examined every property that is being worked. "They are finding values for over a distance of 1500 feet from the main workings, on the big dyke, and as soon as the different people start operations on holdings at a greater distance on the outcroppings." Mitchell is timbering the old shaft on his lease, which is down 108 feet, and has also installed two gasoline hoists, one at each shaft. The second shaft has reached a depth of 120 feet and inside of the next thirty days, he expects to encounter the high grade ore.

Senator T. L. Oddie returned to the camp several days ago, and has ordered a 44-horsepower gasoline hoist. He will start sinking within the next few days.

"The Alamo lease, which is better known as the Original lease, is now down 470 feet and is shipping eighty and 100 tons of high grade ore a day. They started a drift at the 412-foot point, which has encountered a three and one-half foot ledge of the high grade.

The influx of capitalists continues and before long the district will be in a condition to startle the mining world with its finds."

## RUMORED SALE OF MANHATTAN PLACER GROUND

IT IS SAID THAT TOM LOCKHART OF GOLDFIELD MAKES A LARGE PURCHASE.

Burro Jim is the owner of a large part of the placer gulch where a number of the late strikes have been made, and which is considered to be the pick of the placer diggings.


