

LITIGATION CAUSES DECLINE IN STOCK

PITTSBURG-SILVER PEAK STOCK DROPS TO 44 BID AND 45 ASKED.

The heavy decline of the Pittsburg Silver Peak stock during the last few months has caused considerable inquiry, not only among the stockholders in Tonopah, but from those in the east.

The decline is caused by the unsettled condition as to the ownership of the property. Some time ago the district court at Reno rendered a decision giving the title to Barney Gamble, a well known Nevada mining man. Prior to the original sale of the mine, Gamble had an option for \$500,000 on the property, and when it was turned over to the Pittsburg people Gamble was not consulted. The attorneys for the Pittsburg people had the suit transferred to the federal court, which in turn directed that it be tried by District Judge W. H. A. Pike of Reno.

Not long ago Mr. Gamble made a demand for the property which was refused and another law suit is eminent.

Mr. Gamble was represented by the late George W. Baker, father of District Attorney Cleve Baker, and several other prominent attorneys. Cleve Baker is now engaged by Mr. Gamble and is looking out for his interest. He stated yesterday that he thought that the ownership would be settled definitely within a short time.

BIG CASINO TO BE REBUILT IMMEDIATELY

OWNERS OF BUILDING HAVE LARGE FORCE OF MEN AT WORK.

Bright and early yesterday morning Messrs. Summerfield and Johnson, owners of the Big Casino, had a force of thirty-five men engaged in the work of cleaning up the ruins. The floor of the dance hall which is valued at several thousand dollars, will be saved and the owners are now guarding against a possible warping. The bar in this section of the building was scorched in places and also slightly injured by water, but in several days it will once more resemble its condition as it was before the fire.

A large force of men was also employed in repairing the front part of the building, where the gambling and a bar business was conducted. During the fire this room was completely stripped of its contents and yesterday was devoted to moving them back again. In the afternoon a roulette wheel was in operation and today the owners will endeavor to have the bar ready for business.

Last evening dancing was in full swing in the front bar, which will be used temporarily while a larger building is being constructed. The proprietors announced that they would rush the work along and expect to be back in the former place within a very short time.

A careful estimate yesterday of the damage places the loss between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

UNIFORM RANK TO BE MUSTERED SATURDAY NIGHT

TONOPAH COMPANY NO. 4 WILL ENTER INTO EXISTENCE TOMORROW.

On Saturday night at the Nevada theater, Tonopah Uniform Rank No. 4 of the Knights of Pythias will be mustered in by the members of the Goldfield rank headed by Colonel Weatherby. The Goldfield members will arrive from the south on the evening train and will be met at the depot by the local rank. The Tonopah military order has about thirty-five members and with the Goldfield company, compose the only two companies in the state. The visiting team will be banqueted immediately on their arrival and at about 8 o'clock will start on the work of initiating the Tonopah boys into the mysteries attached to that degree of the Knights of Pythias.

IS SURPRISED AT THE GROWTH OF TONOPAH

AND IS MORE SURPRISED TO FIND A COMPLETE PRINTING PLANT IN TONOPAH.

Ellis Bonte, one of the stockholders in the Buckeye, who arrived in Tonopah Wednesday from his home in Cincinnati, made a trip of inspection yesterday around the different points of interest of this camp, in addition to visiting the Buckeye property. Mr. Bonte was considerably surprised to find that Tonopah was at least half civilized and his astonishment at visiting the Bonanza office last evening and finding a complete printing outfit in the heart of the desert, was worth witnessing.

At the Buckeye the shaft has encountered water which is flowing in a small quantity. The formation has changed from rhyolite to later andesite with considerable quartz appearing. The sinking of the shaft will be continued until a greater depth is secured and then drifting will be started.

BIG MILL AT DAYTON WILL BE REBUILT

RENO, May 13.—Word comes from Dayton that Captain Davis, one of the principal owners of the mill destroyed by fire at Dayton recently, is already at work arranging for the rebuilding of the mill. It is stated that the ruins of the mill had hardly cooled before Captain Davis was out in the ruined mill with men clearing away the debris and planning for a new plant.

This plant will, when completed be one of the finest in the state, and will be turning out thousands of dollars in bullion. A man arriving from Dayton last evening states that the mines in that vicinity are picking up and that in a short time he expects to hear great tales of the wealth of that portion of Nevada.


