

# First Gun of Apex Campaign Fired With Suit For \$125,000

GOLDFIELD, May 15.—It has been expected ever since the Tribune announced the purchase of the Conservative claim at Pioneer by D. R. C. Brown and George Wingfield, from the Tobins, the apex situation has finally reached the courts.

An action was filed in the district court yesterday by the Gold Hills Mining and Milling company against the Bullfrog Pioneer Leasing and Milling company and the Bullfrog Pioneer Gold Mines company for \$250,000 damages and for an injunction to prevent the alleged illegal extraction of ore from the Conservative claim by lessees under the owners of the Bi-Metallic No. 3 claim adjoining. Bryant and O'Brien and C. S. Thomas are representing Messrs. Brown and Wingfield, while it is understood that Judge J. C. Helm of Denver will look after the Tobins' interests. The suit is said to be of a friendly nature to speedily settle the question of apex rights.

The complaint recites that the Gold Hills company, which is the purchase of Wingfield and Brown, has owned the Conservative claim at Pioneer since January 19 last. The following day, it is said, the defendant leasing company "entered under the vertical boundaries of said Conservative claim" and converted a large amount of ore to its own use. The leasing corporation claims, so the bill says, that it is operating under an agreement with the defendant mines company which owns the Bi-Metallic No. 3, adjoining. The complaint goes on to say that the lessees have taken out ore worth in the neighborhood of \$250,000 from the vein in the Conservative territory, and the court is asked to award the Gold Hills company damages in that sum, as well as a writ of injunction to prevent further operations in the Conservative ground. No temporary writ is asked, and the matter may not have the first hearing for several days.

## WILL NOT REMOVE MILLS FROM MILLERS

NO TRUTH IN REPORT THAT BIG PLANTS AT MILLERS WOULD BE REMOVED.

Sensational news mongers have been actively engaged during the past few weeks circulating the report that the Belmont and Desert mills would be moved from Millers to Tonopah.

The Bonanza is able to state with authority that this move has not been contemplated by the officials of either company as the cost of transferring the mills here would nearly equal the erection of a new plant. Another reason that shows the improbability of the move is the insufficient water supply of Tonopah. While it is true that several of the mines have encountered water, the supply has not been proved to be equal to the amount necessary to operate the mills. C. A. Higbee, secretary and treasurer of the company, stated yesterday that the subject had never even been brought up before the board of directors.

"The mine will continue to run as it has in the past," said Mr. Higbee, "and the only changes will be in the line of improvements for the best."

Mr. Higbee and J. H. Whiteman, general counsel of the company, will remain in Tonopah for some time yet looking over the workings of the big company.

## GIRL TAKES ARSENIC AND KILLS SELF

MISS ADA SMITH OF MILLERS TAKES FATAL DOSE OF POISON.

Friday night about 5 o'clock Miss Ada Smith at Millers took a quantity of arsenic with suicidal intent and several hours afterwards passed away. The news of the young lady's death came as a shock to the people of Millers, for she has lived in that town since its inception, and was known and respected by all. She was 22 years of age and resided with her parents, two brothers and a sister. Her father and brothers are employed at the Belmont mill. No cause can be assigned to the act for prior to taking the poison she appeared to be in the best of spirits. The remains will be brought to this city Monday and the funeral will take place from the depot, the interment to be in the city cemetery.




