WILLIAM NIBLETT MUST SERVE SENTENCE FOR SELLING WHISKY TO INDIANS.

The appeal made in the case of William Niblett, who was convicted in the fifth judicial district court, on the charge of having sold whisky to Indians, resulted in a decision of the supreme justices sustaining the judgment. Niblett was convicted about a year ago and was sentenced to the state penitentiary by Judge J. P. O'Brien. In the judgment of the supreme court the decisions of the district court are sustained.

CORONERS JURY SAYS DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

WILLIAM MATTHEWS OF MILLERS DID NOT COMMIT SUICIDE.

The coroner's jury called at Millers Sunday to investigate the demise of William Matthews, returned a verdict of accidental death. Matthews was evidently engaged in investigating the mechanism of an old revolver which was accidentally discharged, the bullet entering his head. When the body was first discovered it was thought to have been suicide, although the relatives of the young man were unable to account for the act. The remains were buried at Millers Sunday afternoon. Matthews was a brother-in-law of I. P. McGary, a business man of Millers.

Wandell vs. the Sixty-Six club of Rhyolite. Wandell is suing to recover the small sum of \$10,000 which he avers he lost in the Sixty-Six club while a minor. He was on the stand yesterday and repeatedly referred to the book to enliven his memory. This book he says he made up several months ago and he lost the money a couple of years ago. From appearances the case will occupy the attention of the court for the remainder of the week.

At yesterday's session Wandell also introduced a bunch of checks which he stated he had cashed and had lost the proceeds in the Sixty-Six club. The majority of the checks are made out "cash" and were cashed at the bank by Wandell, some were cashed at other gambling houses, while a few of the number were indorsed by the Sixty-Six.
