

GOVERNMENT TO MAKE SURVEY OF WALKER LAKE

FEDERAL OFFICIALS ARRIVE IN RENO PREPARATORY TO SURVEYING.

C. G. Anderson of Washington, D. C., chief of the topographical department of the United States geological survey, department of the interior, was in Reno yesterday purchasing provisions for a corps of seven government surveyors who are to assist him in some special important work here.

When seen yesterday by a Journal man, the official explained his mission in Nevada. "The department has sent me out here from Washington to prepare surveys and topographical maps of the Walker lake district," said Anderson. "This is my first visit this far west and this city, with all its extent of apparent business, is a revelation to me.

"The exterior township lines were run by the government several years ago, but there has never been a topographic map made of this district, which comprises 4000 square miles of territory. The government has a camp outfit at Yerington, composed of twelve horses and all appurtenances making up a complete equipment, and I will have it at Walker lake in a few days.

"After I have laid in a supply of groceries, canned meats and feed for the stock, which I am buying in your city where I find a good source of supply, I will start for work which will consume at least six or eight months. This section will probably be designated by the department as the Hawthorne quadrangle, various names to be assigned to the sections after our work is completed.

"Our visit here now is the outcome of a plan inaugurated last fall, the foremost reason for this particular tract being selected for early operations being undoubtedly the belief that it contains valuable mineral deposits and a survey and maps would be desirable in the near future."—Reno Journal.

FENWICK SUCCEEDS SCHLOSS IN KEWANAS

MURDER AND SUICIDE.

The San Francisco Call, in its issue of May 9th has a graphic account of a double tragedy in which Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Beach were the central figures. The story is of particular interest because Mrs. Beach was born and raised in Dayton. She was a daughter of Mrs. Saunders, and a grand daughter of W. W. Byron, one of the pioneers of the state. As Miss Lillian Saunders, she became the bride of Mr. Cornish and by him had two daughters, Sylvia and Cora. These children received part of their education in the Reno schools. Later Mrs. Cornish secured a divorce and married Beach. Subsequently she had trouble with him, and at the time of the tragedy she was making her home with her mother, Mrs. Saunders, in San Francisco. Beach and his wife had been separated and when she refused to return to him he beat her over the head with a revolver and then fired two shots into her body, killing her instantly. He then fired a bullet into his own brain and fell dead across the body of the woman he had just murdered. One of the daughters, Sylvia, witnessed the tragedy.

STATEMENT FOR THE QUARTER ON THE SHOSHONE

The latest statement issued by the Montgomery Shoshone company has just been mailed to the stockholders. It covers the finances of the company summarily for the period from November to February last, or four months in all. It gives the production of the mine for that period and also the indebtedness that is set over against these earnings. The months reported on include the primitive days in the development of the property.

The output of the mine for this time ran between \$40,000 and \$50,000 per month. The average net earnings, over and above mining and milling costs is better than \$20,000 for the same period.

The indebtedness is still heavy. According to the present rate of production the plant will have paid for itself by the end of the present year. Since the closing of this report it is safe to figure on a 10 per cent increase in production over a given period.

The Conservative claim, which was the cause of litigation between interests representing the minority stockholders of the Bullfrog Pioneer company and the Tobin brothers, has been sold by the Gold Hills Mining company, the largest amount of stock in which is held by the Tobins, to D. R. C. Brown, the Aspen, Colorado, millionaire, and George Wingfield of Goldfield.

The Bullfrog Pioneer Leasing and Milling company has been given a lease on that portion of the Conservative claim that dips into the vein of the former.

It is hoped that Messrs. Wingfield and Brown have not purchased any

litigation with the purchase of the Conservative, and that the suits recently filed may be amicably disposed of.
