## WILL OPEN A BROKERAGE OFFICE IN TONOPAH

**HARRY STIMLER, THE WELL KNOWN MINING MAN TO LOCATE HERE.**

Harry Stimler, the well known southern Nevada mine operator and the discoverer of Goldfield, will open a brokerage office in the rooms adjoining the Tonopah Banking corporation in the Mizpah hotel building. Mr. Stimler is thoroughly conversant with the numerous mines in this section, which, with his wide acquaintance, makes his success in this venture assured. "Tonopah looks good to me," said Mr. Stimler yesterday, "and I intend to make my future home here. A small part of my time will have to be spent in the Fresno mining district, where I am interested. On my property there I recently let two leases and the operators are preparing to begin development work on an extensive scale. That district has excellent showings and with development should open up some good ore bodies."

## DESERT WATERING PLACES.

The southwestern part of the great basin—that portion of it including the arid areas of southeastern California and those of Nevada that are most easily reached from California points—is known generally to the dwellers in the less arid districts west of the Sierras as "the desert," but local names are applied to its various subdivisions. The most important of the subdivisions are the Colorado and Mohave deserts and the Death valley region. The Colorado desert extends from San Geronimo pass southward to the Gulf of California and includes the depression known as the "Salton sink." The Mohave desert lies farther north and its boundaries are not so definite, but includes much the greater part of San Bernardino county and the eastern portions of Los Angeles and Kern counties, California. The Death valley region, which lies north of the Mohave desert, stretches eastward from the Sierra Nevada, covering a large part of Inyo county, California.

The wells and springs of the desert region are few in number and very irregularly distributed—so irregularly indeed, that although in some districts watering places occur in groups, in others they are thirty to fifty miles apart. Unusual activity in railroad work has so stimulated prospecting that there is a large influx of strangers, many of whom do not fully realize the danger of traveling through an arid region, and it is highly important that the springs and other watering places should be located as definitely as possible and described for the benefit of prospec-

tors and other travelers. It is believed that this urgent need for the dissemination of information in regard to the location of known watering places and the possibility of locating and developing water at other favorable points will be met in part by a report by W. C. Mendenhall, which has just been issued by the United States geological survey as Water Supply Paper 224. The paper includes a map of the region. More than 300 watering places are described and mapped, and the map shows also a number of the principal roads through the desert. These roads have not been surveyed and only approximate locations are possible, but the map at least indicates the usual routes of travel. ## ANXIOUS MOTHER SEEKS NEWS OF HER SON

Cox, superintendent of state police, asking for any information obtainable with regard to the young man. His mother lives at Staten Island, New York, and is extremely anxious to locate him. She does not know whether he is dead or alive.

## ASPHALITE IN NORTHEASTERN NEVADA.

The geological survey's bulletin reporting contributions to economic geology in 1908 (bulletin 380) contains a short paper by Robert Anderson on asphaltite deposits in Eureka county, northeastern Nevada, about fifteen miles south of Palsade. This occurrence is interesting, for no asphaltite deposit has heretofore been found in Nevada. The asphaltite fills fractures in steeply dipping Carboniferous strata that consist of beds of sandy calcareous shale, sandstone, and conglomerate. The mineral is jet black, with a pite-like luster, is very brittle, and in quality resembles impsonite. Mr. Anderson's report is included in an advance chapter of the survey's bulletin 380 (bulletin 380-H), which may be had without charge on application to the director of the survey at Washington.
