

RE BUILDING SUMMER RESORT AT HOT SPRINGS

SOUTHERN NYE WILL SOON
BOAST OF LEADING RESORT
OF THE WEST.

Len P. McGarry, E. C. Barry and Robert Armstrong arrived in Tonopah yesterday from Hicks Hot Springs in the southern section of its county. The gentlemen are interested in the Shoshone Hot Springs, which they recently incorporated and are now at work beautifying the property and building cottages. The place when completed will be one of the leading resorts of the west and the owners intend to have no expense in fitting it up. Ready they have planted 1600 eucalyptus, pepper and a variety of other plants and are now awaiting the arrival of more than twice that number. The soil is very fertile and the actual measurement taken of an eucalyptus planted twenty days ago shows that it has grown seven inches during that time.

In addition to building cottages work has been started on a dancing pavilion and swimming tank. The location of the main resort will be started within a very few days. Len McGarry, who is one of the principal owners in the enterprise, is one of Tonopah's pioneers, and is present largely interested in the enterprise. On the K. K. lease, of which he is half owner, work has been started sinking on the ledge, which has been proven to be forty-four feet in width. The values at the point where the ledge was intersected by the tunnel, will go out \$10.40 to the ton and the shaft will be sunk on the footwall side with the hope of the values increasing with depth. The ledge at this place is at a vertical depth of 55 feet from the surface, where the croppings assayed but a few dollars.

"Pioneer is looking good," said McGarry last evening, "and on the amount of interest being manifested, the camp will be better within the next sixty days than at any time during its entire history. Here are over 300 miners employed and of this number the Pioneer case has ninety at work. They are shipping thirty-five tons of ore daily. "The closing of the banks in Southern Nye has acted as a setback, but now this has been partially overcome and after the next thirty days the business conditions will have become wholly righted." The three gentlemen will leave their today or tomorrow for the south.

HEADQUARTERS OF HOOK AND LADDER COMPANY MOVED

BUILDING ADJOINING BUTLER
HALL TO GO ACROSS THE
STREET.

Yesterday a force of men were engaged in removing the old hook and ladder building on upper Main street. The structure will be moved a point directly opposite on the cant lot there. This action is the result of the insurance companies, who objected to insuring the Butler building, claiming that the hook and ladder house was a sort of fire trap and could easily be the cause of a conflagration, as a carelessly thrown cigarette would start a fire, there being no one to watch the interior. The new site will be quite a benefit to the volunteers as at the present the boys have a small amount of difficulty in removing the fire fighting apparatus owing to the poor plans of exit offered.

PROVIDE MEANS TO PREVENT REMOVAL OF R. R. MACHINE SHOPS

Business Men Appoint Committees to Interview Merchants to Secure Routing of Freight by S. P. and T. & G. Railways.

At the Eagles' pavilion last night a goodly number of citizens assembled for the purpose of uniting in such action as would manifest the great desire of Tonopah to hold here the general offices of the Tonopah and Goldfield railroad company and to have the repair shops of that company rebuilt in this town. Roger Stenson was elected temporary chairman, giving way after a short address to R. P. Dunlap, who was elected permanent chairman by acclamation. After the election of W. J. McCabe as secretary, the object of the meeting was outlined by Mr. Stenson.

Joe Ballet explained that the railroad company was not looking for any subsidy or bonus to rebuild the shops in Tonopah, but rather looking to this town for substantial appreciation in the way of routing freight via the northern instead of the southern gateway.

Mr. Fitzgerald spoke of the need for immediate action and moved that the chairman appoint a committee of five for the purpose of drawing up resolutions expressing the wishes of the people of Tonopah regarding the rebuilding of the shops and retention of the general offices of the railroad company in Tonopah. Mr. Degan's amendment was added hereto, providing for the committee interviewing the merchants and getting their assurance that their freight would be routed via the Southern Pacific and Tonopah and Goldfield. This amendment was carried unanimously after Mr. Dunlap had pointed out that while resolutions were very nice and all that, yet what the railroad company really needed was the business coming to Tonopah and to have that business routed via Mina

in order that the Tonopah and Goldfield might receive its just proportion of the haul. Mr. Dunlap stated that some merchants in Tonopah were buying in San Francisco and Sacramento and routing their shipments via the Santa Fe and Tonopah and Tidewater railroad, thus giving the Tonopah and Goldfield railroad only the short haul from Goldfield. He pointed out that every cent of the Tonopah and Goldfield payroll is expended in Tonopah, and invited declaration from anyone showing any expenditure here on the part of employees of the southern road.

Upon the chairman stating that he would entertain a motion for the appointment of a committee to prepare an agreement for submission to and signatures of the merchants of Tonopah agreeing to route their shipments via Mina and the Tonopah and Goldfield, Mr. Stenson offered such a motion which was unanimously adopted.

After considerable general discussion, participated in by Messrs. McKim, Ballet, Wittenberg, Malley, Fitzgerald, Degan, Uhland and others, the meeting adjourned.

The committee to draft resolutions to the Tonopah and Goldfield railroad company will consist of the following named gentlemen, who are requested to meet at the office of Berry and Cole, State Bank building, Friday, July 30, at 3:30 p. m.: R. C. Moore, W. B. Alexander, J. H. Uhland, W. D. Cole and H. H. Atkinson.

The committee to confer with shippers, composed of the following gentlemen, will meet at the office of R. P. Dunlap, Tonopah block, Friday, July 30, at 10:30 a. m.: W. S. Johnson, Roger Stenson, Tom Kendall and Harry E. Epstein.

ETTA COLE WILL BE FREE AUGUST 15

HER TERM OF TWO YEARS IN
THE STATE PRISON WILL
EXPIRE THEN.

The sheriff's office was notified yesterday that Etta Cole, who was sentenced in December, 1907, to serve two years in the state penitentiary at Carson for receiving stolen goods, would be liberated on August 15, her term of sentence having expired.

It will be remembered that Etta Cole was sent up from this county and was sentenced by Judge O'Brien in the district court. She assisted in drugging another woman and was found guilty of receiving jewels taken from the drugged woman. Her associate in the drugging was Frank Hart, who received a sentence of ten years and is now serving time. It is understood that friends of his are endeavoring to secure a pardon for him, but it is not known what success they are meeting with.

LAST JUROR IS SECURED IN FORD CASE

ACTUAL TAKING OF TESTIMONY
STARTED YESTERDAY
AFTERNOON.

The twelve men good and true, who are to decide the merits of the case of the state of Nevada vs. W. F. Ford, charged with embezzlement, were selected during the morning session of the district court yesterday, and at the convening of court in the afternoon actual taking of testimony commenced.

The first witness was Peavine Johnny, who occupied the stand during the afternoon. Peavine Johnny, Indian, is the complaining witness and in the indictment states that Ford secured a note he owned and negotiated the amount called for in cash, without his consent. Numerous objections were injected into the examination of Johnny by the defense and quite an argument ensued when the question was asked if Johnny had two wives. It is evident that the trial will consume another week.
