SENATORS HAVE THE BILL READ IN ITS ENTIRETY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—The conference report on the Philippine tariff was agreed to by the house today. The measure is supplementary to the Payne tariff bill and is intended to provide enough additional revenue to make up the amount which will be lost to the Philippine government by the enactment of a provision of free trade between the United States and the Philippines.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Beginning its consideration of the conference report on the tariff bill by a tedious reading of the document which was insisted upon by the senators who proposed to see undue haste not exercised in the final passage of the measure, the senate dragged along nearly seven hours today, without accomplishing any important results.

"This Country Stands Between Gallows and Grave."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Discussing the exclusion of the Democratic members of the tariff conference, in the senate today, Daniel said a peculiar fraud was committed by both houses of congress.

"This country stands at this moment between the gallows and the grave," declared he, commenting on the methods of the majority. "I charge that the senate is apparently in control of a lynch-law."

President Taft Fooled as Well as the Western Solons

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Hides and the leather question again delayed legislation on the tariff bill and the conferees were called together once more today. Western senators will compel a further change in the hide and leather schedule.

NEW TRIAL IS ORDERED FOR HENRY WEBER

RENO, Aug. 2.—In an opinion of the supreme court of Nevada, written by Judge Norcross and concurred in by the other members, judgment of the district court of Esmeralda county in the case of Henry Weber, who was sentenced to serve seven years in prison for embezzlement, was reversed and a new trial ordered.

The reversal of the lower court and Judge Langan, who presided at the trial, is based on the objection urged by defendant's counsel, that while it might be conceded that the selling of \$10,000 worth of shares of the Dostor Mining company at Goldfield was proved, there was no proof to the effect that Weber had appropriated the proceeds to his own use.

It was urged that no demand on Weber to disgorge had ever been formally made, and it might be that he had the money ready to turn over when called upon to do so.

FIRST JUROR IS SECURED IN THE CALHOUN TRIAL

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—The first juror in the second trial of Calhoun, on indictment charging him with bribery was temporarily passed today. Fifteen hundred talesmen have been summoned to court since the trial commenced two weeks ago.

TWO KILLED AND SEVERAL INJURED

(By Associated Press.) MORELOS (Mex.), Aug. 2.—Two men were killed, three hurt, several houses swept and all crops destroyed by the bursting of a dam across the San Juan river near here yesterday. The wreck of the dam was caused by a cloudburst. The damage estimated at \$500,000.

Thirteen prospective jurors were examined during the day, twelve of whom were passed temporarily, one challenged for bias being excused. It is believed it will take two weeks to secure a jury.

TOKIO, Aug. 2.—News has been received here of a terrible flood in the province of Chang Chun, Manchuria. In the city of Kirin, situated at the head of steam navigation on the river Sungari, 225 miles from Mukden, 1000 persons have been drowned and 7000 houses submerged. The water is still rising.

A WITNESS TELLS OF GETTING FIVE FROM FORD

JIM FARRINGTON, AN INDIAN, ON THE STAND TELLS OF FORD.

Save for the evidence of Jim Farrington, an Indian, yesterday's session of the district court, so far as it concerned the trial of W. F. Ford on the charge of embezzlement, was uninteresting.

Farrington stated that Ford got the notes supposed to be the property of Peavine Johnny on a statement that he (Ford) would have to use them in the appeal of the case to the supreme court in which Mr. Clifford and Johnny were the interested parties.

"What did you get," asked counsel for the state. "I got \$5," was the reply. "What did you get that for," inquired the prosecutor. "It was money Ford owed me," responded the Indian.

That evidence showed that the defendant liquidated at least one honest obligation. It also showed that Farrington was another who got something out of the tangle. Peavine Johnny hasn't introduced any evidence yet to show that he got anything.

Charles Richards was out on the stand to explain certain documents which on Saturday he said he thought he had. Investigation on his part revealed that the letters must have been burned up or mislaid. He was excused. Edward Clifford, Sr., was another witness. He told of giving the defendant the money that was to have been paid to the Indian.
