MORE LEASES ARE GRANTED ON JIM BUTLER

SUPERINTENDENT BRADY ASSIGNS THREE CHOICE LOCATIONS YESTERDAY.

Superintendent S. H. Brady of the Belmont and Jim Butler companies yesterday granted three more leases on the latter property. One was secured by T. J. Lynch which includes the shaft under the Eagles' pavilion. William Beauchamp secured a block between the Wandering Boy and Gold Hill, while the third lease was assigned to Joe Rodgers, Pete Beko and O. M. Church and comprises blocks 30 and 63. All three parties will start operations at an early date and are now engaged in making the necessary preparations.

STOCK MARKET

The reports received yesterday from the San Francisco stock exchange stated that trading was light with very few calls for stock. As a natural consequence, the southern Nevada securities were affected and declined in price. The majority of the Tonopah stocks were unaffected by the exchange's actions, and remained stationary. Belmont declined 2 points while both Extension and Montana lost 1 point.

Goldfield Consolidated was the heaviest loser, the quotations showing a decrease of 12 1/2 points. Fraction dropped to .71 bid, a loss of .3. Daisy also suffered and tumbled 2 cents. Booth remained nominal. Pittsburg Silver Peak fell to .50 bid, a loss of 4 cents.

WORK IN THE STONE CABIN MINE STARTS TODAY

LEASES WHO ASSUME CHARGE WILL OPERATE ON FIRST LEVEL.

Dave Holland, Ed Malley, W. S. Johnson and H. J. Hall, who secured a lease on the Stone Cabin shaft from the Jim Butler people, will commence operations in that mine today. The first work will be conducted on the 100-foot level and in a few days the zone will be extended so as to include the 200 and 300-foot levels. There are several bodies of ore already known to exist on these levels and the lease should prove to be a producer from the start. The gentlemen who have the lease will not confine the work to the extraction of ore, but will do considerable development work in the hope of encountering new veins.
